



NORTHAMPTON COUNTY Man missing for day from work facility

A 24-year-old Montgomery County man was missing for more than 24 hours from Northampton County's Community Corrections Facility in West Easton, the Department of Corrections reports.

Marquise Johnson, who was serving a four-month to 20-month and 19-day sentence after pleading guilty in March to receiving stolen property and later violating parole, left the facility at 8:30 a.m. Friday on work release, the department of corrections said. He was expected back at 6 p.m. He was returned to the prison at 5:07 p.m. Saturday, the department of corrections said.

Johnson was originally arrested June 29, 2014, while dribbling a basketball on the shoulder of Interstate 78 East in Lower Saucon Township.

Pennsylvania State Police said at the time, Johnson was about two miles from a 2014 Nissan Maxima which was supposed to be on a car dealer's lot and didn't have a license plate, police said. A license plate was sticking out the front of Johnson's shirt and the top of his shorts, police said.

Johnson was arraigned on several charges, including unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, but on March 30, he pleaded guilty to receiving stolen property and eight other charges were withdrawn, court papers say. He was sentenced to 66 days to 23 months in prison — including time already served — and was released April 1 on parole, court papers say.

He violated parole and on Oct. 16 was sent back to jail to serve at least four more months, court papers say. He was granted immediately work release, police say.

The news release didn't say

where Johnson was picked up after not returning from work release.

A 19-year-old New Jersey resident held a knife to the throat of a Riegelsville 18-year-old at a northern Bucks County gas station, Pennsylvania State Police report.

Troopers responded at 8 p.m. Saturday to Robert Thigpen's home to take a report that Thigpen was threatened at 1440 Easton Road in Durham Township, police said.

No one is in custody, police did not name the 19-year-old or specify where in New Jersey he lived and police didn't provide a time or date of the incident.

The investigation is continuing, police said.

ALLENTOWN Cops: Shoes-iphone trade became robbery

A 19-year-old man is charged in a robbery that began with a meeting on an Allentown shoe trading page on Facebook, Pennsylvania State Police report.

The victim, an East Allen Township woman who is also 19, negotiated a trade of shoes and money for an iPhone 6, police said.

Kornelle Kinsey Davis, no address listed, along with two other males, arrived at 8:35 p.m. Jan. 8 at the victim's home in the 7900 block of Meadow Road, police said. Davis parked in a dark area of the driveway and told the victim to come to the vehicle to trade the items,

police said.

Davis then took the items before fleeing, police said. The investigation revealed Davis' identity, allowing him to be charged with crimes, police said. Court papers were not immediately available detailing the charges, but police said the incident was a robbery.

Davis does not appear to be in custody, online records show.

BETHLEHEM Cops: Driver going 100 on Route 22 was drunk

A 31-year-old Bethlehem man was drunk when he drove 100 mph on Route 22 East in Hanover Township, Northampton County, Pennsylvania State Police say.

Israel Soto III was pulled over at 2:23 a.m. Dec. 26 at the Route 512 interchange after a trooper saw him driving 45 mph above the 55 mph speed limit, police said.

A strong odor of alcohol was detected and further investigation determined Soto was drunk, police said.

While police didn't provide Soto's blood alcohol content in a news release, one of the charges says his BAC was above 0.16. Penalties start for most drivers at 0.08.

Soto is charged with DUI, DUI highest rate (more than 0.16), exceeding 55 mph by 45 mph and reckless driving, court papers say.

Charges were filed Wednesday, court papers say, and a preliminary hearing is scheduled 9:15 a.m. Feb. 10 in District Judge James Narlesky's Hanover Township court.

4 from Somerset face drugs and weapon charges

Easton Area schools redistricting plan to be released at meeting

Easton Area School District administrators will release elementary school redistricting plans at Tuesday's school board meeting.

The agenda for Tuesday's meeting posted Monday on the district website indicates Assistant to the Superintendent Alyssa Emili will make a redistricting presentation.

The presentation will cover plans to move all the fifth graders from Easton Area Middle School into the district elementary schools, according to school board President Frank Pintabone.

Moving the fifth graders out of the middle school will enable the district to move of Paxinosa Elementary School students to Easton Area Middle School during the 2016-17 school year for \$16.5

million in renovations to Paxinosa.

Easton Area School District may move fifth grade to elementary schools.

After the Paxinosa kids return to their renovated school, the district's alternative school will move into the middle school building. Then the district can sell the academy building at 2035 Edgewood Avenue in Palmer Township.

It's unclear how the district plans to redistrict elementary sending area boundaries when the fifth graders go back to the elementary schools.

"We are not making any information on this available prior to discussing it with the board at the meeting," said Superintendent John Reinhart.

Emili didn't return an email seeking comment.

Reinhart said a forum for parents with questions about redistricting will be on Wednesday at Tracy Elementary School.

It starts at 7 p.m., according to district PTA council President Michelle Robertson.

The last elementary redistricting was in 2009-10, when more than 700 students were shifted different schools.
