

IV tournament at South Western High School. But there was plenty of mat action on Tuesday in the form of the District 3 Team Championships.

A decade ago, the Indians competed in the team tournament, losing their first-round matchup with Spring Grove.

They've come close since then but haven't cracked the top 16.

Manheim Central was the first highly-seeded team to fall. The top-seed JA Barons lost to No. 9 Dallastown, 31-30, in a quarterfinal meet.

Manheim Central was one of four teams to host first-round and quarterfinal contests, making for a long night of wrestling. When the semifinals are held today at Spring Grove High School in York County, two York-Adams League teams and two Mid-Penn Conference teams will be represented.

Sixth-seed Chambersburg, which wrestled Waynesboro last Saturday in the Tribe's final competition of the regular season, lost to No. 11 Cumberland Valley, 37-20.

The Eagles (14-3) then defeated No. 3 Central Dauphin, 32-30 to advance to the semifinals against Spring Grove (22-0). The Rockets topped Penn Manor and Gettysburg.

In the upper part of the bracket, Dallastown

(15-3) will face Cedar Cliff (18-1), which beat Exeter Township and New Oxford.

The losers of Tuesday's meets are paired up in the consolation bracket, also scheduled for today at Spring Grove.

The championship finals and consolation finals are 1 p.m., Saturday at Milton Hershey School.

The top four placers advance to the PIAA Championships.

PIAA DISPARITY

When the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association expanded classifications for most sports two years ago, teams in seven sports entered a new paradigm.

The effects were felt most by schools vying for berths in respective district playoffs, especially in the top two classifications where sports expanded to six classes. While the decision was intended to level the playing field for schools across the Commonwealth, the side effects were immediate.

In the case of basketball, the disparity in numbers is evident at a glance. There are 37 teams in 5A but only six in 2A. The number of teams eligible in each class is determined by the total teams in that respective group.

But how does that improve the optics of the postseason? Clearly, it doesn't, which opens the door for two questions: Was the PIAA trying to mimic other states who field teams in at least six classifications

in power sports (football and basketball)? And, was the move made with the intent of proping up the so-called "elite" programs in football and basketball?

The classification makeover was not without irony, something the Waynesboro varsity football team experienced — well, sort of.

In 2015, the final year of four classifications in football, the Indians finished 6-4. Class AAAA consisted of 29 teams, with the top 16 qualifying for the district playoffs. The Tribe finished 17th in the district power rankings.

Fast forward one year later. In 2016, Waynesboro finished 7-3 in 5A, which was also made up of 29 teams. However, only the top eight teams played in the postseason.

The push for expanded classifications had been on the docket for the past two decades.

Now that it is a fact of life, schools are still coming to terms with the ramifications. Based on male and female enrollments by sport, it might be simple math, but in the case of Waynesboro girls' basketball, it is fair to have the Maidens in 6A? Remember, programs can choose to opt up but not down, meaning Waynesboro has to find a way to compete on the level of the Cumberland Valleys of District 3.

Smith is "one of the best competitors and teammates me anymore," Redskins tight end Niles Paul tweeted. Chiefs tight end Travis Kelce posted on Twitter. "Someone who I owe a lot of my success to, and a guy that's been a class act through all the ups and downs."

The Redskins acquired Smith and signed him to the kind of long-term deal they

balked at with Cousins, who became the first QB to play back-to-back seasons on the franchise tag. Cousins can become a free agent next month at age 29.

"Nothing really surprises me anymore," Redskins tight end Niles Paul tweeted. Chiefs tight end Travis Kelce posted on Twitter. "Someone who I owe a lot of my success to, and a guy that's been a class act through all the ups and downs."

Cousins, drafted by the Redskins in the fourth round out of Michigan State in 2012 — the same year they traded up to Griffin

with the No 2 pick — likely leaves Washington for the fourth-most passing yards in franchise history, more than 16,000.

Under coach Jay Gruden, Cousins became the first Redskins QB to start all 16 games for three consecutive seasons. He threw for at least 4,000 yards in at least, while totaling 81 touchdowns and 36 interceptions. But Washington only played in one playoff game during that span, going 0-7, 8-7-1 and, most recently, 7-9 in Cousins' time as a starter.

of how long he would last, rather how long it would take for him to get sharper.

"Ninety holes over five days in a row ... I know he did that in the Bahamas, but those were 3 1/2 hours, and now we're playing five-hour rounds," caddy Joe LaCava said. "That makes a difference because you're adding about seven, eight hours on your feet, playing golf, thinking about what to hit, and hitting shots. So I'm glad he got through that. I'm not saying health isn't going to be an issue, but it certainly looks better than it has."

The only concern was off the tee. Woods hit 17 out of 50 fairways for the week, tied for last among the 77 players who made the cut. He hit only three fairways in each of the final three rounds, and his drive on the par-5 10th hole on the North Course was 65 yards left of the edge of the fairway.

But then, that might have worked in his favor.

How else would he get a sense that his back could handle so many violent swings required to get him out of that mess?

"Some of the shots I had to hit out of the rough, out of the trees, shaping them both ways, and a few times I had to jack up the speed," Woods said after the final round. "And had no issues at all." The issue was being there

in the first place, but there's time.

Woods headed home for two weeks before he comes back out to California for the Genesis Open at Riviera, a course where he made his PGA Tour debut at age 16 in 1995 but last played in 2006. He's likely to play the Honda Classic a week later, and then have two weeks off before the Arnold Palmer Invitational at Bay Hill. That might be it before the Masters. Woods is not in the two World Golf Championships in March. He is contemplating the Valparaiso Championship at Juniorsville, but that would mean four tournaments in five weeks, and that might be too much too soon.

If there was curiosity about his performance at Torrey Pines, there is even more about how he plays Riviera.

"We can see the swing is out of sync. He can feel it's out of sync," six-time major winner Nick Faldo said before the final round. "I'm thinking he's going to go away for two weeks and it will be very interesting if he can put his finger on the things he needs to work on."

Keeping score should be easy in golf, except when it comes to this version of Woods.

There is a call for patience because he has played so little tournament golf and even less with a semblance of good health. But at some point, he should be measured against the field. He should be measured not so much by winning, but by having a chance.

Asked what he thought of Woods' return, two-time U.S. Open champion Curtis Strange took the right path.

"It's not for me to pass judgment on four rounds of golf," he said Tuesday. "I'm giving him most of the year, and then we'll revisit."

In the meantime, his return was as advertised.

Tournament officials issued a notice a few hours after Woods two-putted for birdie from 75 feet to make the cut on the number. It said public parking for Saturday was sold out.

The gallery for the final group on Saturday — which included Jon Rahm, who had a chance at reaching No. 1 in the world — was typical of the last two years, mainly because the thousands of additional fans were with Woods. From behind the third green, one could see across the gorge to the 14th hole, where fans stood shoulder to shoulder from the tee to the corporate box next to the green.

On Sunday, Woods worked his way through the gallery behind the eighth green, across the 18th fairway and then through another throng to get to his final hole. Everyone wanted a glimpse of him. Right after Woods walked by, one woman broke into a big smile and said to her friend, "Those 45 minutes were so worth it."

There is no greater appeal in golf than Woods, especially when it looks as though he might be around a while.

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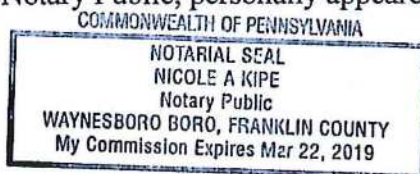
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

Suspect in Kentucky school shooting charged with murder

The 15-year-old student whose rampage at a rural Kentucky high school left two teenagers dead was charged with two counts of murder and 12 counts of first-degree assault, authorities said Wednesday.

Assistant County Attorney Jason Darnall said the shooter, whose name has not been released because he is a juvenile, was charged in juvenile court. Darnall said he will request that the case be transferred to adult court.

Authorities previously said the teen would be charged with murder and attempted murder, but Darnall said the assault charge would be easier to prove than attempted murder and carries the same penalty.

Students at Marshall High School in Benton described a terrifying scene of gunshots, shock, panic and a wild scramble for safety on Tuesday. Bailey Nicole Holt, 15, died at the scene. Preston Ryan Cope, 15, died a short time later at a hospital in Nashville, Tennessee. Eighteen other teens were injured in the chaos, 14 of them from gunshot wounds.

"No one screamed," said Alexandria Caporali, 16. "It was almost completely silent as people just ran."

She said she was eating breakfast in the school's atrium when she heard a gunshot and turned to see the shooter nearby. She said she knew him as a happy, quiet boy who played music. She took refuge in a classroom as shots continued to ring out.

"It was one right after another — bang, bang, bang, bang, bang," she said.

Heather Ligon, mother of two teens at the school, said her sons described the shooter as someone who was cracking jokes whenever they saw him. Ligon said when she arrived at the school, her youngest son Bryan, 14, crawled to her in a panic.

Bryan told her he had been close enough to smell the gunpowder from the shooter's handgun.

Leide Waymon and Baleigh Culp, both 16, said they had been talking about basketball and makeup when they heard a bang. Baleigh said she thought nothing of it "until I saw a body

drop on the ground and the bangs continued." Bullets, she said, were "flying everywhere."

She ran to the street, continued to hear shooting behind her and kept running until a man pulled her into a business where other students were also hiding.

Lexie said she was so overcome by fear that initially she couldn't even run. "I got up and tried to run, but I fell," she said. She saw only blackness. "I heard someone hit the ground. It was so close to me."

She got up and ran more than a mile to a McDonald's.

The shooting spree is the latest in a long line of such tragedies. Last month a former student at Aztec High in Aztec, N.M., walked into a classroom and fatally shot two students and himself. This month alone, 11 shootings at or near schools across the nation have been reported.

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Jail worker is county's employee of the month

CHAMBERSBURG - A correctional treatment specialist for the Franklin County Jail, who is described as being dedicated to helping inmates and advocating for their needs, was recently honored as the employee of the month for January.

Emily Hutton has been employed with the county since September 2014, and was one of 13 people who were nominated for this month's recognition. The Franklin County Commissioners, on behalf of the STAR Committee (Special Thanks and Recognition) presented the award to Hutton this week.

Hutton's dedication, compassion, diligence, innovation and motivation were all attributes her colleagues described her as on the nominations forms.

On one nomination form, one of her colleagues mentioned her dedication "to assisting inmates in being successful when returning to the community." The colleague went on to tell the story of a time when Hutton helped an inmate with serious medical needs obtain housing, medical equipment and other services.

"Without her intervention, this inmate would still be housed at the jail without an adequate home plan. But instead, with Ms. Hutton's diligence, he was given a fresh start in 2018," the colleague said.

Another colleague talked about Hutton's work as a member of the Franklin Together's Case Review Task Force.

"She works tirelessly in advocating for inmates' needs and assisting them in their transition back to the community," the colleague said.

St. Thomas man accused of trying to date teen, threatening her

ST. THOMAS - A St. Thomas man in Franklin County Jail after a teen girl accused him of propositioning her for a date, then threatening her after she reported it to police.

Dwaine Richard Heinbaugh Jr., 30, is charged with felony intimidation of a witness or victim, misdemeanor corruption of minors, indecent assault and summary citations of harassment, according to online court documents.

A 15-year-old reported Heinbaugh on Dec. 16, for allegedly making sexual advances and grabbing her thigh in the process, as well as propositioning her through Facebook, according to court documents.

The girl told investigators that Heinbaugh was trying to have sex with her, and referenced an incident from Thanksgiving, according to court documents.

The girl described Heinbaugh being at her house, driving with a relative and "acting creepy," according to court documents.

She said Heinbaugh kept staring at her, was hanging out in her bedroom with her and her friends, and encouraging some of the friends to kiss in front of him.

When the girl was alone in her room, Heinbaugh allegedly came over and sat next to her, putting his hand on her right upper thigh, according to court documents. Heinbaugh allegedly told the girl "I think we should date," according to court documents.

The girl told police she told him "no" and that "he was gross and a pedophile," according to court documents. This upset Heinbaugh, so she left her room to get away from him. Heinbaugh then "passed out" in the girl's bed, so she slept on the floor, she told police. When she woke up, Heinbaugh was sleeping next to her with his arm around her, underneath her neck.

The girl told police when she told a parent about the incident, Heinbaugh was prohibited from entering the house.

After the incident, the girl said Heinbaugh threatened her and a friend of her's, according to court documents. The two friends were at the girl's house

when Heinbaugh told them he would tell police she was having sex with him for drugs, as well as other answers he would tell police when they interviewed him.

When other friends of the girl heard about the threats, they went over to Heinbaugh's house to confront him, according to court documents. The girl said she did not ask them to confront him, but that someone recorded the encounter, including Heinbaugh saying "She came onto me."

The girl played the video for investigators. In it, according to court documents, Heinbaugh could be heard "yelling and screaming" and telling the group "Yeah I'm going to smack the s*** out of all of ya'll. She came onto me. She came onto me right. She came onto me right. I have a recording right here on my phone."

Heinbaugh could be heard telling the group he had a recording of the group confronting him, because he had been recording all day long.

The girl's father confirmed what the girl had told him about what happened, according to court documents.

Police interviewed Heinbaugh on Jan. 26, and he admitted to being at the girl's house around Thanksgiving, according to court documents. He originally claimed he was only there for about 10 minutes and did not have any contact with her. He claimed he only waved at her, and that he had never been alone with her or slept over at her residence.

When police confronted Heinbaugh with the girl's recording, Heinbaugh "suddenly remembered" an incident that occurred with the girl, where she said "I think you're cute," according to court documents. Heinbaugh told police he couldn't give them any other specifics of the incident, and said he hadn't told police about it because he had forgotten about it.

Heinbaugh is being held at Franklin County Jail on \$35,000 bail. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for Feb. 20.
