Dear Secretary McNulty:

On February 16, 2010, the Met-Ed Industrial Users Group ("MEIUG"), the Penelec Industrial Customer Alliance ("PICA"), and the Penn Power Users Group ("PPUG") (hereinafter, "MEIUG, et al.") filed Comments with the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission ("PUC" or "Commission") in response to the revised Energy Efficiency and Conservation Plan tariffs ("EE&C") submitted by Metropolitan Edison Company, Pennsylvania Electric Company, and Pennsylvania Power Company (hereinafter, "Companies") in the above-referenced proceeding. Specifically, MEIUG, et al. raised concerns with the Companies implementing a \$200,000 per meter per year cap upon each customer for purposes of participation in the EE&C programs.

Since filing the aforementioned Comments, MEIUG, et al. has spoken with the Companies, who indicated that this limit was placed in the rebate contract of the Companies' third party conservation service provider, SAIC. Upon review of this provision, the Companies committed to MEIUG, et al. that, at this time, the Companies have placed no limit on available program incentives per metered account for individual customers under the Companies' EE&C program. To that end, the provision in the aforementioned rebate contract, which reserves the right to limit the amount of the program incentive to \$200,000 per meter per year, will not be implemented and will be removed from contract materials. In addition, the SAIC contract has been corrected on the Companies' website so as not to include the aforementioned cap.

In addition, the Companies have indicated that, if they do choose to consider proposing a cap on program incentives per metered account, the Companies believe such a change to the EE&C plans would need to be approved by the Commission. While MEIUG, et al. does not agree with placing caps on customer participation in the EE&C programs, MEIUG, et al. agrees with the

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Companies' position that any such proposed modification would require a formal filing with the Commission and requisite approval.

Based upon the aforementioned representations by the Companies, MEIUG, et al. believes that the concerns raised in its February 16 Comments have been resolved, and for this reason, MEIUG, et al. withdraws its Comments at this time. As shown by the attached Certificate of Service, all parties to this proceeding are being duly served. Please date stamp the extra copy of this letter and kindly return it for our filing purposes.
