



nature the Peapackton bridge, a wooden covered bridge that spanned the Conowing Creek near East Berlin. It was damaged during Hurricane Agnes. He and another man, Stephen Rob, were swept away when they fell into the icy waters of the Conowing.

agreed to move it. He has a lot on Hillen Avenue in Dover Township waiting for it. In about a month or so the house will be on a new foundation and have a two-car garage, ready for its new owners. It's for a family which, Cruise said, is currently renting and would otherwise be unable to purchase a home.

"It'll be a pretty good deal for them," he said.

The three-bedroom house began its journey to its new location at about 9 a.m. Thursday, creeping through Mount Waff and Manchester

to North George Street. The move went smoothly, except for a flat tire shortly after it left North Sherman Street. After three hours, and 5 miles, Cruise and his crew called it a day, leaving the house in a gravel lot at Church Street. Cruise said it will be easier to haul the house for its final 5-mile stretch Friday morning.

The 114-ton house will make the journey intact, he said.

"It's not a piece of glass," he said. "It'll take being a little bit lopsided. The driver has to go on to be sure it stays flat."

Once it's at its new location, he said it'll take two days to get the foundation ready and after that, about a month to hook up the plumbing and electricity.

Moving the house, he said, is "pretty straightforward." "You just take it one step at a time," he said. "If you tried to do everything at once, you'd never be able to do it."

Smith said Tallo had been prepared to testify at a PFA hearing.

"By allowing him to agree to the PFA without a finding by the court in no way means that Tallo agrees there was no abuse," Smith said. "Tallo is cooperating with the criminal investigation being conducted by the State Attorney General's Office, Smith said. The office is not commenting on the investigation.

The signed PFA order prohibits any contact between Tallo and Kelley except for "any incidental contact" in the York County Judicial Center, where both work.

The order states that Kelley will pay the costs of the PFA action, which typically is about \$200.

According to documents filed in the county Prothonotary's Office, the PFA is to expire Nov. 17, 2011. Final PFA orders can run up to three years.

York County Court administrator J. Robert Chuk, who is handling all such questions for the court, said the agreement without an admission "eventually means what it says."

"Neither side, and think about it, primarily the defendant, is admitting to anything," he said.

Chuk said that such agreements are "very common" in York County and that neither Kelley nor Tallo received any special treatment by the court.

"It's not unusual at all," he said. "This was actually treated very normally."

Chuk noted that of the 64 final PFA orders granted last year in York County, 240 were by agreement.

## Kelley, Tallo statements

The following statements from lawyers representing York County Common Pleas Court Judge Thomas Kelley and public defender Jason Tallo refer to allegations in a proffered-from-abuse order filed by Tallo against Kelley. The allegations have not resulted in criminal charges. The state attorney general is investigating. The statement from Suzanne Smith, Tallo's attorney, came in response to the statement from Christopher Fero, Kelley's attorney.

### Kelley's statement

"Judge Kelley, a childhood survivor of domestic violence, raised by a single mother who survived some, has been a public servant for the people of York for the last twenty years. He moved 'up' to take a job as a prosecutor so he could represent victims in pursuit of justice."

"As a prosecutor, Judge Kelley wrote the first protocol for response to domestic violence ever established in York County. During the thirteen years as a prosecutor he achieved an unparalleled record and had a reputation as a dogged advocate of victims of both physical and sexual abuse. This record and reputation won him overwhelming bipartisan support and a seat on our bench at the age of 30."

"As both an advocate, as well as a jurist, he has pursued, contacted and supervised perpetrators of violence and abuse. Hundreds of victims call him friend. Moreover, those who know the parties know that the allegations that have been made against Judge Kelley are completely contrary to the character and reality. Those who do not know him will surely rely on aspersions being cast against a public figure."

"The judge's wish prior to the alleged incident was that he have no contact with the accuser. After consultation with me, he has agreed with my decision that he wish for no contact can be accomplished by the agreement that has been filed today."

"Most importantly, with respect to the agreement, all parties have agreed that there has been no finding of abuse."

"Judge Kelley continues to be an integral part of the York County Family Law Service. The order merely formalizes my client's proffered wish to have no contact with the plaintiff."

"Any judicial comments or statements on records, records or speculation will have to be sought elsewhere."

### Tallo's statement

"The purpose for a proffered-from-abuse order is to stop abuse. Clearly, Tallo had for a PFA to stop the abuse by Judge Kelley. By allowing him to agree to the PFA without a finding by the court in no way means that Tallo agrees there was no abuse."

"Most importantly, with respect to the agreement, all parties have agreed that there has been no finding of abuse."

"While the plaintiff and the judge (Adams County Judge John Korman) agreed that the PFA order should be in place to provide some protection and security from the man who made her a victim of domestic violence, the reality of the situation is that the PFA will not prevent the physical and emotional scars caused by her abuse."

"She continues to cooperate with the attorney general's criminal investigation."

President Judge Stephen P. Lintbaugh said Wednesday the final resolution of the PFA dispute will not affect Kelley's judicial assignment.

temporary PFA was granted in February, and he accepted Judge Richard K. Remm to remain in civil court, Lintbaugh said.

The state Attorney General's Office has not commented on its investigation.

# NATO assumes some command of Libya no-fly zone

But the U.S. military was left in charge of the brunt of the combat for now.

WASHINGTON — The United States welcomed a partial handover for the Libyan air campaign to NATO on Thursday, but the allies apparently talked at assuming full control and the U.S. military was left in charge of the brunt of the combat.

NATO agreed to take over command of the newly established no-fly zone over Libya, protective flights meant to deter Libyan transport planes from putting warplanes in the air.

That leaves the U.S. with responsibility for attacks on Gadhafi's ground forces and other targets, which are the toughest and most controversial portion of the operation.

The U.S. had hoped the alliance would reach a consensus Thursday for NATO to take full control of the military operation authorized by the United Nations, including the protection of Libyan civilians and supporting humanitarian aid efforts on the ground. It was not immediately clear when the allies could reach agreement on the matter.

"We are taking the next step. We have agreed along with our NATO allies to transition command and control for the no-fly zone over Libya to NATO," Secretary of State Hillary Clinton said.

"All 28 allies have also now authorized military authorities to develop a operations plan for NATO to take on the broader civilian protection mission," Clinton said.

Lines of authority were unclear Thursday night, but it appeared the NATO decision sets up dual command centers and opens the door to confusion and finger-pointing. U.S. commanders would presumably be chiefly responsible for ensuring that the NATO protective flights do not conflict with planned combat operations under U.S. command.

The Pentagon indicated U.S. warplanes will keep flying strike missions over Libya.

Senior administration officials said the breakthrough came in a late-night telephone call with Clinton and the foreign ministers of Britain, France and Turkey.

The four worked out the way forward, which included the immediate transfer of command and control of the no-fly zone over Libya, and by early next week of the rest of the U.S.-mandated mission.

The officials, speaking on condition of anonymity to discuss sensitive military planning, said the actual handover of the no-fly zone would occur in one or two days.

They said NATO would have a final operational plan

## Rebels make more gains

After losing ground to Ghaddafi's forces, rebels based in the eastern city of Benghazi showed signs Thursday of regaining momentum against Moammar Gadhafi.

Col. Ahmed Omar Sufi, the rebel spokesman, said some government troops in the northern city of Ajlunyah had lost contact with their commanders and were negotiating to withdraw. The talks hinge on rebel demands that the government forces surrender their heavy weapons.

Sufi appealed to other rebels for heavy weapons to help the lightly armed volunteers fight Gadhafi's forces.

Sufi's uncertainty is whether tighter restrictions will be imposed on allied airstrikes against Libyan army ground units once the U.S. units are pulled out.

Under the existing rules of engagement, U.S. and allied planes are patrolling a no-fly zone to prevent Libyan aircraft from flying.

They also are carrying out attacks on Libyan ground forces, ammo dumps, missile sites and headquarters facilities.

"People just left, and they left not knowing if they would return, or what provisions to take with them," said Eric Epstein, chairman of TMI Alert, a safe energy group that monitors Three Mile Island and two other nuclear plants in Pennsylvania.

"People were running from something they couldn't see," said Epstein, who was away at college at the time.

Conflicting news accounts and widespread uncertainty prevailed as residents in the southeastern Pennsylvania countryside crushed banks with withdrawals and overwhelmed long-distance phone lines. A third of the state's 2,000 employees in Harrisburg failed to show up for work in the immediate aftermath.

### Partial meltdown

The TMI Unit 2 had been operating for only three months when errors on the part of the plant operators turned a routine equipment failure at about 4 a.m. into a partial meltdown of the plant's core and a release of radioactive elements.

A pump failure on the non-nuclear side of the operation was compounded by a series of mechanical failures and human errors that resulted in too little water coolant being used to control the temperature of the reactor's uranium fuel. A molten radioactive mass very nearly burst through the 8-inch-thick steel pressure vessel before plant workers restored the flow of water coolant, bringing down the fuel temperature.

Two days later, on March 10, officials detected an uncontrolled release of radiation from the plant, prompting the evacuation. Later, they learned plant operators had planned the release to ease pressure within the system. Two days of working that a hydrogen bubble inside the plant might explode followed.

An angry Lt. Gov. William Scranton III accused the plant owners — General Public Utilities Corp. — of ignoring conflicting information.

### Worst accident

The TMI accident is classified as the country's worst commercial nuclear power plant accident ever: the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission didn't receive an application for a plant license for almost three decades after that.

In 1984, the plant operator, a CPU subsidiary, pleaded guilty in federal court to using inaccurate test methods, manipulating the test results, destroying records, and not filing proper notice that the plant's cooling system had extensive leaks.

In the years following, more than 2,000 people who feared they were harmed by radiation leaking from Three Mile Island sued over the accident, saying exposure to radiation caused leukemia, birth defects and other

health problems. In 1990, U.S. District Court Judge Sylvia Rambo in Harrisburg threw out all the damage claims, saying plaintiffs couldn't master the evidence necessary to support their cases.

Today, Pennsylvania is home to five nuclear plants with a total of nine nuclear reactors, or units. Three Mile Island's Unit 2 is mothballed, while Unit 1 continues to operate.

### Going door to door

Robert Houser, now 62 and a resident of Virginia Beach, Va., was then a volunteer firefighter in the borough of Steelton, about 10 miles from the plant. He was dispatched to go door to door with leaflets, advising residents of the danger and possibility they'd be asked to flee.

"Some people cursed you out for disturbing them, some people were just as scared as you," Houser recalled.

Houser had no choice but to stay with his wife and two kids. He didn't have much money and all of his relatives lived in the shadow of the plant, he said, so he had nowhere to go.

"Go where? How long? Am I ever going to be able come back?" Houser said. "These were all things that were going through your mind back then."

His current wife, Lorraine, 62, was also living near TMI. She and her then-husband had wanted to leave with her mother, their young daughter, and their pets. They rose early the morning of March 11, threw suitcases into their two cars and headed 75 miles to the east to her aunt's farm in Limeport, Pa.

Lorraine Houser doesn't recall any hysteria among the evacuees or being afraid herself. She said she didn't know how to explain the events to her daughter.

"You didn't want to say, 'Hey it might blow up, we've got to get out of here,'" she said.

Aidletown Mayor Robert Reid was also present, his little town just three miles from the TMI cooling towers built on a sliver of island in the Susquehanna. He stayed behind as about a third of the populace of about 10,000 fled.

The borough had no emergency response plan back then and that has haunted him ever since. While Unit 2 has never been restarted, Three Mile Island's adjacent Unit 1 remains in operation.

"There's not a week that goes by that my coordinator and I don't sit down and talk about our evacuation plan and our disaster plan," said

Reid, 78.

"Yes indeed — y, it's not going to catch me napping like it did in 1979."

### Annual reviews

All of Pennsylvania's municipal nuclear emergency plans are reviewed annually and tested every two years, said Henry Tamariani, chief of the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency's technological hazards division.

Among the details: An engineering firm produces an estimated evacuation time that takes into account road capacity, population, weather conditions and other factors.

Thornburgh said this week that he was startled in 1979 to learn that two counties near TMI, on opposite sides of the river, each had evacuation plans that called for their residents to cross the same bridge over the Susquehanna — straight into the oncoming paths of the other's evacuees.

He and his advisers, he said, scrambled to respond to TMI on the fly. The evacuation question loomed over their internal discussion along with the knowledge that large-scale evacuations raise safety issues of their own, he said.

"You get people who are out on the road when they shouldn't be, or driving a speed they shouldn't be," Thornburgh said. "It's not a risk-free undertaking."

Epstein was critical of the state's pre-1979 emergency planning, saying it did not include the cities of York, Lancaster and Harrisburg, all within 25 miles of TMI.


He said plans directed evacuees onto impractical routes, assumed farmers would leave their animals behind, did not make sufficient provision for the very young and the sick and established relocation centers too close to the nuclear facility.

"It was uneven," Epstein said. "When you issue a precautionary evacuation for a limited population you have to assume the remaining population will leave, and that was not the assumption."

### Now and then

Nowadays, plans for evacuating people from the immediate vicinity of nuclear facilities, developed by local officials and the state and federal emergency management agencies, are the result of decades of work.

The authority to order evacuations is governed by state and local law — in some states, such as Pennsylvania, the governor may decide, while in others, local jurisdictions may act.

Officials must tell the public what routes to take, establish the locations of shelters and distribute potassium iodide tablets to protect human thyroid glands from radiation. The Federal Emergency Management Agency said in 2005 that more than 4.8 million Americans lived

within 10 miles of a nuclear power plant.

Those who lived through Three Mile Island, or have worked to improve emergency readiness in its aftermath, are watching eagerly as events unfold in Japan.

"You should plan for an accident on a Friday night during a snowstorm when there's a Penn State home game scheduled for Saturday — which was what we thought the Japanese had done," Epstein said.

"I don't know that anybody anticipated a three-headed Hydra threat like they have."

**Carlisle woman indicted for interfering with IRS**

A Carlisle woman was indicted in federal court last week on charges she tried to obstruct the administration of Internal Revenue Service laws. Ahdrea Longenecker, 47, did not file tax returns with the IRS in 2000, 2002, 2003 or 2007. U. S. Attorney Peter I. Smith said in a press release. On June 7, 2010, IRS Automated Collection Services issued a Notice of Levy to Longenecker's employer to withhold \$6,133 of her wages as garnishment for unpaid 2004 taxes, Smith said. Soon after, Longenecker sought hardship relief through

the IRS Taxpayer Advocate Service. The advocate assigned to work with Longenecker quickly discovered she never filed tax returns in 2000, 2002, 2003 and 2007. TAS then sent a letter to Longenecker saying she was not eligible for assistance until she filed the missing tax returns. Instead of properly filing them, Longenecker is accused of scanning TAS letterhead and forging a letter authorizing the release of the levy on her wages and emailed it to her employer, Smith said. Longenecker was indicted March 16 by a federal grand jury in Harrisburg. If convicted, Longenecker would face a maximum of three years in prison and a possible \$5,000 fine.
