Woodland earns his first PGA Tour win

◆ GOLF: Gary prevails in Transitions Championship after 4-under 67 in final round.

Woodland made only one par in the back nine Sunday at the Transitions Championship, and it gave him his first PGA Tour victory and a trip to the Masters.

Woodland surged into the lead with three straight birdies, and fell out of it with back-to-back bogys. Tied for the lead on the final hole at Ironhorse in Florida, the big hitter from Kansas holed a 10-foot par putt to finish off a 4-under 67.

That proved to be the difference moment later when Webb Simpson also went long on the 15th, and his chip down the fairway 20 feet by the hole. Simpson missed the putt to shoot 69 and finished one shot behind.

Woodland, who played college basketball at Washington until he decided to transfer to Kansas to play golf, became the first player to score his inaugural PGA Tour title at Ironhorse.

"I can't come out here and hit the golf ball 900 yards and win," said Woodland, managing only slightly. "I was very conservative this week, laid back almost all day — all four days — and just tried to get the ball in the air, get it on the green and let the putter do the work. That's what I'm learning."

Woodland finished at 16 under 158 and earned \$500,000, moving up to No. 3 in the FedEx Cup standings.

Webb Simpson, a PGA Tour rookie who caused every eye on the West Coast to swing to the bottom of the status ladder, shot a 70 and finished above on third, which gets him in the Houston Open in two weeks.

WEBB SIMPSON FOR LPGA: Webb Simpson is expected to win the LPGA Founders Cup for her second straight victory, shooting a 5-under 66 to beat Brittany Lincicome and Paula Creamer by a stroke.

Webb won when Lincicome bogeyed the final hole, missing a 10-foot par putt.

The 36-year-old Hall of Famer, the winner five weeks ago in Simpson, earned \$200,000 for the Chrysler & Dana Reeve Foundation and Japan relief efforts in the charity event at Waikiki Golf Club in Hawaii.

Instead of playing the day after, the tournament honoring the 12 late founders donated \$1 million to charity — half to the LPGA Foundation and its LPGA-USGA Girl Golf programs and half to the 100-100 women's designated charities.

Webb has 18 LPGA Tour victories, also winning the previous year's Founders Cup.

include a portion of York County said he has requested a hearing to hear details, including the cost.

"I would call it tough love," Alloway said. "This isn't intended as some mea-culpa proposal at all. If someone is becoming addicted to drugs, we need to get them the help that they need. And it helps them be more accountable for the taxpayer dollars they receive."

The last legislation was drafted by Sen. John Wozniak, D-Johnstown. He said drug testing for employment has become common, so it makes sense to test those who are seeking state assistance. The law would indicate marijuana and cocaine use, he said.

"If you're going to be getting support from the taxpayers, I think the taxpayers deserve to see that it's not going to illegal drugs," Wozniak said.

Alloway said he agreed to cooperate in discussing the legislation.

The legislation is still being discussed in committee, but Alloway said about 5 percent of those receiving public assistance would be randomly chosen to be tested once a year. He said deciding the percentage that would be tested, but believes 5 percent would be an easy, accurate number to test.

Alloway said the testing is meant to be a deterrent because those who fail the test would become ineligible for assistance.

"You're not automatically thrown out onto the streets," he said. "That's not the intent from the supporters. It forces you to go into a drug rehab program to help you get yourself straight. Then you can go back on the public assistance."

The cost of the drug testing has not been determined yet. County public assistance offices would be in charge of providing the tests for local residents.

Alloway is working to set up a hearing for the legislation, possibly in the fall.

Reaction: Rep. Eugene DiPasquale, D-York City,

said there is a strong desire to ensure benefits are going to the people who need them; most are using them for the proper purpose. Lawmakers are still debating ways to accomplish that, he said.

DiPasquale said he would like to hear the details of the bill after its hearing. He said he would not support a bill that puts an additional burden on taxpayers in order to complete the drug testing.

"The goal of making sure people who are supposed to get it, get it and when it's supposed to go for a worthy goal," he said. "I'm glad that the Senate is going to have the discussion."

The ACLU: The American Civil Liberties Union, however, is already challenging the legislation. Andy Hoover, legislative director at ACLU of Pennsylvania, called the bill "ineffective, expensive and probably unconstitutional."

In the case of Marchwinski v. Howard 2008, the ACLU fought similar legislation in Michigan. It went to the U.S. Court of Appeals where it was struck down.

Drug abuse does not only occur at the poverty level, Hoover said. The ACLU feels the legislation is strictly singling out the state's poorest residents to test. Hoover said, "The legislation would come with a hefty bill for the drug tests, at which point other states that have considered similar legislation dropped it."

Hoover said, "Finally, because drug testing is considered a search, Hoover said, officials would need to exempt the individual had committed a crime in order to meet the criteria for a search. Short of suspicion, the drug test would violate the Fourth Amendment, he said."

"Really what these folks need is not some punitive measures," Hoover said of individuals who fail drug testing. "They need treatment. We need to make a greater investment in treatment."

A York City man is in county prison on \$500,000 bail for his alleged involvement in the shooting of a city woman last month.



The law-prevention officer suffered bumps, bruises and a cut on his neck during the attack, but declined treatment at the scene, Leah said. Neither the bystander nor McDaniel was hurt, Leah said.

Fatal fire an accident

A house fire that killed an elderly brother and sister Thursday in Washington Township has been ruled accidental, police said.

State police said some type of combustible material, probably furniture, ignited near a wall-mounted propane heater. The blaze started in the first-floor living room of 715 Rife Road, police said.

Both victims died of carbon-monoxide toxicity due to smoke inhalation, according to the York County Coroner's Office, which has ruled the death accidental.

Police said nothing should be placed within three feet of wall-mounted propane heaters. In Peterson's home, items had been placed within a foot of the heater, police said.

A neighbor spotted the fire about 6:20 a.m. and called 911, police said.
