Philadelphia Gas Works:

Starting in 2003 Mr. Taylor was paying Philadelphia Gas Works (PGW) \$51.00 per month for use of their service. PGW cut off Mr. Taylor's service before his last two payments and kept it off for an entire month. Mr. Taylor presented PGW with doctor's slips, notifying the company that is a 65 year old man with Narcolepsy. Mr. Taylor's doctor's slips were ignored and his service was still disabled. Once Mr. Taylor's Gas service was returned he decided to make payments of \$125.00 per month. Paying this amount would catch Mr. Taylor up on the amount owed to PGW.

Mr. Taylor has consistently paid \$125.00 each month, but each year PGW disables his service once or twice. When service is disabled Mr. Taylor was charged a fee even though he did not miss any payments. The gas notice of shut off also comes with an electric notice. During the time Mr. Taylor's gas was off he also received requests for liheap money per month. Mr. Taylor felt that his money was not being dispersed properly; therefore he slowed down his payments. When the service was cut back on a PGW employee must come into Mr. Taylor's home and check the meter. On three occasions the PGW employee removed Mr. Taylor's meter from his home, which is Exhibit 6 in this case. Once the meters were removed they were replaced with different meters.

Prior to Mr. Taylor paying \$125.00 per month, he only owed the gas company a few hundred dollars. By making payments of \$125.00 per month Mr. Taylor was paying 1,500 dollars per, which exceeds the amount owed. Mr. Taylor has been making payment on time, but his amount owed only seems to grow. April 14, 2011, PGW offered Mr. Taylor a deal to pay \$120.00 per month, which is \$5.00 less than what he was paying for 8 years. The objective of his deal was to have Mr. Taylor's amount owed paid within 6 months. Because of Mr. Taylor's disability he needs to use PGW's service for light, heat, and hot water. Mr. Taylor uses very little gas; his gas bill would be between \$30-\$40.00 per month if the bill was determined by gas used.

Mr. Taylor has come to the courts because he has been paying for a service that is rarely used. Mr. Taylor even pays for the service when it consistently disabled without legit reason. These endeavors with Philadelphia Gas Works have caused Mr. Taylor pain, suffering, and mental anguish. Therefore, he seeks the monetary compensation of \$333,000,000, as well as, his bill fully paid up to date. Mr. Taylor also requests a Judge order to prevent further harassment.
