

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Public Notice

Transmission Line Construction

PPL Electric Utilities Corporation (PPL Electric) plans to improve reliability and meet increasing demand for electricity in Lancaster County. PPL Electric plans to accomplish these goals by increasing the operating voltage of an existing power line, and constructing a small section of new transmission line. This project will be located in the Townships of East Hempfield, Manheim, Warwick and West Earl, and the City of Lancaster, Lancaster County.

All work associated with this project will be performed either on property owned in fee by PPL Electric or within existing PPL Electric right-of-way. No additional right-of-way is required. A new 138 kV transmission line, approximately 1,360 feet in length, will be constructed to connect the existing transmission lines to the 138 kV transformers at PPL Electric's South Akron Substation, near the intersection of Oregon Pike and Old Akron Road. In addition, approximately 12 miles of existing transmission line will be modified to meet current 138 kV standards so that the operating voltage can be increased from 69 kV to 138 kV.

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Shiite militias. The 46,000 U.S. troops currently stationed in Iraq are to leave by year's end under a 2008 withdrawal agreement.

However, the White House is offering to keep up to 10,000 American soldiers in the country beyond that deadline, if asked by Iraq, to help stabilize the country's still-shaky security and keep Iran from becoming too cozy with Baghdad officials.

In Washington, the top U.S. military official said weapons flowing from Iran into Iraq

of saying the loss of U.S. forces in Iraq, coupled with the increasing Iranian weapons, would make the country a national security risk for America.

Some U.S. officials oppose keeping U.S. troops in Iraq beyond this year. They fear the recent uptick in American deaths will continue if soldiers remain in Iraq — a risk they say is not worth taking.

Thursday's bomb in Baghdad, which was detonated near a checkpoint outside Victory Base Camp, was a power-

the attack. Victory Base Camp serves as the headquarters of the U.S. military in Iraq and is home to thousands of American soldiers and contractors.

The slain soldiers were not identified pending notification of their relatives, and no other details were immediately available.

The most recent attack brings the number of U.S. troops who have died in Iraq to 4,471 since the 2003 invasion, according to an Associated Press count.
