PENN STATE CHILD SEX SCANDAL

Legislature proposes tighter rules

Both parties offer bills to strengthen reporting of child abuse

HARRISBURG — In the wake of the alleged child sex-abuse scandal at Penn State, state lawmakers have introduced bills to strengthen the mandatory child abuse reporting law. "It is clear that a loophole exists in our law," said state Rep. Kevin Boyle, D-Philadelphia. "My legislation would close that loophole by requiring those who are aware of the abuse to report it to law enforcement authorities, rather than simply following an in-house chain of command." In addition to Boyle's bill, state Sen. Kim Witko, R-Scranton, wants the state to increase criminal penalties for failure to report child abuse.

The state's required reporting law specifies that professionals who "in the course of employment, occupation or practice of their profession, come into contact with children" must report any suspected abuse. A bill introduced by state Rep. Mike Vereb, R-Montgomery, would create a new offense for sexual assault by a sports official — specifically applying to coaches, referees and other employees of sports organizations.

That measure is designed to target groups like The Second Mile, which was founded by former Penn State assistant coach Jerry Sandusky. According to a grand jury report, Sandusky found his alleged victims through the organization. A victim activist group said the proposals would be law enforcement, but a law professor said they would be an "overfix" to the problem. Unintended consequences

Sen. Casey seeks hearings

STATE COLLEGE — U.S. Sen. Rob Casey on Tuesday asked for a hearing into how federal laws apply to the investigation of the child sex-abuse case that has engulfed Penn State.

In a letter sent to Sens. Barbara Mikulski and Richard Burr, Casey called for a hearing in a subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor and Pensions. He said he wanted to see how well federal laws protect children and to ensure that provisions for reporting suspected cases are in place.

Pennsylvania is not one of the 18 states that re-

quire all adults to report suspected child abuse. "The serious nature of these allegations and the evidence on the public record of failure to report by individuals at Penn State warrants an immediate review of the relationship between federal and state reporting requirements on child abuse and neglect," Casey, a Democrat, wrote.

Justine Sessions, a spokeswoman for the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor and Pensions said it was "closely monitoring this situation and the ongoing criminal and civil investigations, and will take Sen. Casey's request under consideration."

"Reports should be made immediately (to law enforcement or children services) so you don't expose the victim to multiple interviews, which exposes victims to additional trauma and hinders the criminal process," said Palm, who

ring instead to let the voters decide at the polls.

When Monroe County President Judge Ronald Vitan assigned her in February to temporarily take on retired Stroud Township District Judge Thomas Shiffer's jurisdiction in addition to her own, York saw this as a sign of Vitan's confidence in her ability to handle extra work.

"I don't believe I have anything to be ashamed of," she said. "And now, someone else will be serving Chestnut Hill and Jackson. The voters have decided. That's how it goes."

Route 209 was damaged from Hurricane Irene and Tropical Storm Lee. Flooding and ground saturation caused sections under the road surface to be washed out. National Park spokeswoman Deb Nordeen said. The service closed the road Oct. 21 after a landslide at mile marker 15.3 left debris on the road.

Because it is a federally owned road, the Federal Highway Administration is in charge of repair work although the Park Service will ultimately pay the bill. The administration last week awarded an initial emergency contract to GA and FC Wagnon, Inc.

The company is also working on Old Mine Road and Route 615, two New Jersey roads in the recreation area that were closed due to storm damage. Route 615

will likely be open by the end of November.

With winter approaching, only engineering can be done before snowfall. GA and FC Wagnon will draw a plan to repair the road.

The Federal Highway Administration will wait until spring to advertise for a contractor to do the work. An estimated cost for the project is not yet available, administration spokesman Doug Micox said.

is producing gas, and the reclamation stage, when companies restore the land to pre-drilling conditions. Most of the jobs are created in the first stage.

Kelsey advised anyone interested in re-entering in a business related to the gas industry to be involved in the early stages and be able to quickly recoup your investment. "It is critical to keep in mind that at some point this is going to end. We don't know if it's 30 years or 50 years. When the resources

are gone, the work is done," Kelsey said.

Many gas companies have found the most impacted industries are trucking and railroad facilities to bring in supplies, along with construction, quarries, hotels, food service and the financial sector.

Possible business ventures include rental homes, water hauling, pipeline construction, catering, surveyors, stormwater and other professional services.

Kelsey gave common sense advice for doing business with the gas industry, such as to find out which companies are doing business in your area and reach out to them.

Many gas company officials prefer to communicate through email, he said and most companies have purchasing agents to buy goods and services.

It seemed there were some activists in the audience. Occasionally during the presentation, questions were asked about how the gas industry affects water quality. One person suggested that Pike County Economic Development hold another seminar to discuss the negative impact drilling could have on business owners such as real estate agencies. There are no Marcellus shale wells in Pike, but several gas pipelines run through the county.
