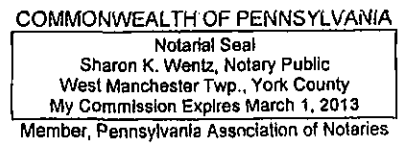

Ward holds every significant franchise receiving record, including receptions, receiving yards and touchdowns. His 1,000 career catches rank eighth all time, and he is one of two players with at least 1,000 receptions and two Super Bowl rings.

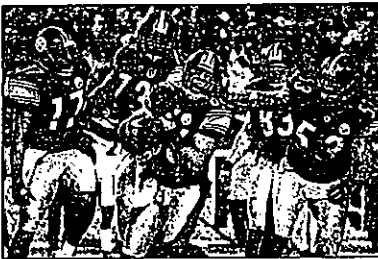
The decision comes three weeks after the 36-year-old was released by the Steelers in a salary cap maneuver. Ward says he was contacted by several clubs but never had any formal discussions. He knows there are no hard feelings for his release, understanding that football is a business. As if to prove the point, Ward embraced Steelers owner Art Rooney II after ripping away from the podium following the announcement.

"Thank you Mr. Rooney for giving a small town boy from Forest Park, Ga, a chance," Ward said.

The former third-round pick out of Georgia was due to make \$4 million next season, an expensive option for a player whose role diminished significantly in 2011 when he finished with 47 receptions. His career starts his rookie season in 1988. He embraced his role as mentor to Pro Bowlers Mike Wallace and Antonio Brown, even though he knew they were chewing into his playing time.

"I know the wideouts are going to be in great hands," he said. "They're full of talent."

Ward's breakout season came in 2001

when he set a franchise record with 94 receptions then obtained that mark in 2002 when he finished with 112 catches.

He made four straight Pro Bowls from 2001-2004 and seemed to get better as he aged. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 2003 Super Bowl after catching five passes for 123 yards and a touchdown in Pittsburgh's 21-0 victory over Seattle, the franchise's first championship in 38 years. The Steelers added a second title in 2010 by giving them six, more than any other team in the league.

Ward's blue-collar attitude rang true

to a fan base where hard work is a way of life. Ward understands the unique relationship the Steelers have with the city and to launch it by making a last-gasp attempt to pad his career stats didn't interest him.

"I want my legacy here to say, you know what he was one hell of a football player who gave it his all," Ward said. "I'm truly blessed. I played to three Super Bowls, won two Super Bowls, was Super Bowl MVP - what more could a player want out of his entire football career?"

After his photo op with Elway and owner Pat Bowlen, Manning answered many of the questions that have been bouncing around since March 7, when his old team, the Indianapolis Colts, released the quarterback and set in motion one of the most dramatic free-agent pursuits in history.

On the neck injury that kept him off the field through 2011: "I'm not where I want to be. I want to be where I was before I was injured. There's a lot of work to do to get where we want to be from a health standpoint."

On his potential role in being the man who could bring about the end of Tabow's popular cry in Denver: "I know what kind of player Tim Tabow is, what kind of person he is, what an awesome great it was. If Tim Tabow is here next year, I'm going to be the best teammate I can be to him. He and I are going to help this team win games. If other opportunities present themselves to him, I'm going to wish him the best."

On Elway's role in leading him to choose Denver over other suitors, the most serious of which were the Titans and 49ers: "I'm seeing him as the leader of a franchise. I really liked what he had to say. Everyone knows what kind of competitor he is as a player. I can tell he's just as competitive in this new role. That got me excited."

And so, the deal was sealed.

Manning has a five-year, \$61 million contract and plans to retire in Denver. His familiar No. 18 was actually retired - a tribute to Denver's first quarterback, Frank Tripucka, who was more than happy to let Manning bring it out of mothballs. The Broncos, meanwhile, have some protection in the way the contract was structured. There's no signing bonus. Manning will get \$10 million guaranteed for next season, but must pass a physical before each season, starting in 2013, to get paid.

What is the biggest star?

The largest stars are so big that they may be as much as 2,000,000,000 (2 billion) miles across. If a star that big were in the center of our solar system, where the Sun is now, it would be so big that it would swallow up all the planets from Mercury to Saturn, including Earth! The Sun is about 860,000 (860 thousand) miles across. If you rode in a car at 60 miles/hour, it would take 5 whole years to drive all the way around the Sun - without any rest or gas stops!

All stars are so huge that our entire Earth, with all its oceans, mountains, cities, forests, deserts, and everything else is tiny compared to them. If the largest star were a ball as tall as your school room, Earth would be about the thickness of one of your hairs.

By the way, you might be able to go outside on the next clear night and see one of the largest stars. Try to find the lovely constellation Orion, with its distinctive "belt" of 3 stars in the center, and then look above the belt to the nearest bright star. It may appear just slightly red. It has the odd name Betelgeuse (pronounced BAY-tell-juh-see). It may not be the largest star, but it is certainly one of the largest. We don't know its exact size, but it is around 600,000,000 (600 million) miles across. It could stretch from where the Sun is out past the orbit of Mars, and might even get all the way to Jupiter.

As long as you are looking at Orion, notice the bright star below the belt, about the same distance from the belt as Betelgeuse but in the opposite direction. It is called Rigel (pronounced like RYE-jell), and it is one of the brightest stars around. It is farther away than most of the stars we see without a telescope, but it still manages to outshine most of them. It is about 40,000 (40 thousand) times brighter than the Sun.

To help you find Orion, you can download a star finder at The Spac e Place, <http://spac eplace.nasa.gov/starfinder>. O r i o n is visible November through April.


