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

# Residents take action

Middletown gathering aims to improve the struggling borough's future

Pastor Vernal E. Simms Sr. wants to see Middletown move forward. The borough is facing a budget shortfall, cutbacks, closing its emergency communications center and ending its funding of the library.

And those are just the known problems. There's also a swirling storm of rumors.

Simms wants to help residents of Middletown move from worrying and complaining to being a community taking action.

"I have said to many people that for a lot of Middletown's problems, the ultimate fix isn't finding a solution now, it's getting the borough to care again," he said.

Couragen never directly invited, but he has flyers about the meeting, he said.

"Nobody has notified myself or borough staff to the best of my knowledge," Couragen said.

He said Borough Council already has committees.

"In areas where they felt the need to reach out for help and expertise, they have done so," he said. "Council already involves citizens. We have a task force to look at the finances, which includes two professors from Penn State."

Simms also hopes to establish an on-going, informed body of residents to attend Borough Council meetings and ask intelligent questions, he said.

## Death of hero in Libya could ignite violence

MISRAFA, Libya • One of the Libyan rebels credited with capturing Moammar Gadhafi in a drainage ditch nearly a year ago died Tuesday of injuries after being kidnapped, beaten and slashed by the late dictator's supporters.

The death of Omar Shaban, who had been hospitalized in France, raised the prospect of even more violence and score-settling in the North African country, with the newly elected National Congress authorizing police and the army to use force if necessary to apprehend those who abducted the 22-year-old and three companions in July near the town of Sirte.

Gadhafi was captured Oct. 20 in his hometown of Sirte and was killed that day by revolutionary fighters.

The Libyan government said it would honor Shaban with a funeral befitting a hero.

Libya is battling lingering pockets of support for the old regime, and its government has been unable to rein in armed militias in a country riven by deadly protests against an anti-Islamic video, by war in Syria, by rising tension over a nuclear Iran and more marked the dramatic shifts that have occurred in the year since the General Assembly's last ministerial meeting, when democratic uprisings in the Arab world created a sense of excitement and optimism.

Obama had tough words for Iran and condemned anew the violence in Syria as Bashar al-Assad tries to retain power.

Obama offered a pointed contrast to GOP opponent Mitt Romney's caught-outside comment that there is little hope for peace between Israelis and Palesti-

nians.

"Among Israelis and Palestinians," Obama said, "the future must not be longed for to those who turn their backs on a prospect of peace."

Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon's opening state of the world speech to the General Assembly's president, prime ministers and monarchs sketched the current time as one when "too often, divisions are exploited for short-term political gain" and "too many people are ready to

take small flames of indifference and turn them into a bonfire."

The leaders are assembled here as anger still churns over a made-in-America video that mocked the Prophet Muhammad. The video helped touch off protests throughout the Muslim world that have left at least 40 people dead.

Obama, a onetime professor of constitutional law, delivered what amounted to a lecture on what he presented as the

backdrop importance of free speech, even if it comes at a price.

He stressed that just as the "cruel and disgusting" video did not reflect U.S. values, the backlash against it did not represent the views of most Muslims. Still, he said, "The events of the last two weeks speak to the need for all of us to address honestly the tensions between the West and the Arab world that is moving towards democracy."

Obama said the notion of controlling information is obsolete "when anyone with a cellphone can spread offensive views around the world with the click of a button." But he said leaders must be swift to respond to those who would answer hateful speech with violence and chaos.

He warned that while there is hope of resolving the dispute over Iran's nuclear program through diplomacy "time is not unlimited." Without laying out specifics, he added: "The United States will do what we must to prevent Iran from obtaining a nuclear weapon."

Dina Zakaria, a spokeswoman for the Muslim Brotherhood's political party Freedom and Justice, said cultural differences between the U.S. and the Muslim and Arab world over the limitations of free speech will persist.

"No one can argue against freedom of expression, but the Western understanding of it is different from ours," she said. "Will this freedom allow for contempt of religion? For us it is different. For us it is a red line as Muslims and Christians as well."

# A call for tolerance

At the U.N., Obama stresses free speech. But a Muslim observer says Western and Arab divisions will remain.

UNITED NATIONS • Confronting global tumult and Muslim anger, President Barack Obama exhorted world leaders Tuesday to stand fast against violence and extremism.

Obama argued that protecting religious rights and free speech must be a universal responsibility, not just an American obligation.

"The impulse towards intolerance and violence may initially be focused on the West, but over time it cannot be contained," Obama warned the U.N. General Assembly in an urgent call to action underscored by the high stakes for all nations.

The gloomy backdrop for Obama's speech — a world riven by deadly protests against an anti-Islamic video, by war in Syria, by rising tension over a nuclear Iran and more

marked the dramatic shifts that have occurred in the year since the General Assembly's last ministerial meeting, when democratic uprisings in the Arab world created a sense of excitement and optimism.

## Ban demands move to end war

UNITED NATIONS Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon demanded international action Tuesday to stop the war in Syria. He held a somber gathering of world leaders that the 18-month conflict had become "a regional calamity with global ramifications."

President Barack Obama pledged U.S. support for Syrians trying to oust President Bashar Assad — "a dictator who massacres his own people."

Ban said in his state of the world speech that he was sounding the alarm about widespread insecurity, inequality and intolerance in many countries. Putting the spotlight on Syria, the U.N. chief said, "The international community should not look the other way as violence spirals out of control."

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## Spaniards take to streets over financial crisis

MADRID • Spain's government was hit hard by the country's financial crisis Tuesday as protesters enraged with austerity cutbacks and tax hikes clashed with police near Parliament, and the nation's high borrowing costs rose again.

More than 1,000 riot police blocked access to the Parliament building in the heart of Madrid, forcing most protesters to crowd nearby avenues and shutting down traffic.

Spain is struggling in its second recession in three years with unemployment near 25 percent.

Concerns over Spain's public finances also came to the forefront earlier Tuesday when the Treasury sold \$3.4 billion in short-term debt but at a higher cost.

The government is expected to present a new batch of economically painful reforms on Thursday when it unveils a draft budget for 2013.

## Romney, Obama focus on foreign policy

NEW YORK • With the United Nations as a backdrop, President Barack Obama and Republican challenger Mitt Romney engaged in a de facto debate on foreign policy Tuesday.

Obama defended his record in the turbulent Middle East and Romney vowed to act more decisively in the interests of the U.S. and its allies, particularly Israel.

Obama urged the General Assembly to exercise patience for what he called a "season of progress" as oppressed populations in the Arab world oust long-established dictatorships. He boasted of his adminis-

tration's support for revolutions in Tunisia, Egypt, Yemen and Libya, and he called for an end to the bloodshed in Syria and the departure of President Bashar Assad.

His remarks came two weeks after the U.S. ambassador to Libya, Christopher Stevens, and three other Americans died in an attack on the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi and anti-American protests broke out in Egypt and across the region.

Romney appeared at a nearby meeting of the Clinton Global Initiative to paint Obama as focklers in foreign policy, leaving the appearance that the U.S. is behind the curve of events. "We feel that we are

at the mercy of events, rather than shaping events," he said.

While he argued that "religious extremism" was part of the problem in the Arab world, he accused Obama of projecting an image of weakness that emboldens U.S. enemies.

Noting that Iran is "moving toward nuclear weapons capability," he said Obama had been insufficiently protective of Israel.

Romney also unveiled a proposed redesign of U.S. foreign aid to "access the transformative nature of free enterprise" part of his latest effort to build a more muscular foreign policy while emphasizing economic programs.
