Notice is hereby given that on June 7, 2013, PPL Electric Utilities Corporation (PPL Electric or the Company) filed with the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (Commission) the Application described above for authorization to reconstruct the Lake Harmony-Lake Naomi single circuit 138/69 kV transmission as a double circuit 138/69 kV transmission line in portions of Coolbaugh, Pocono, and Tobyhanna Townships, Monroe County and Kidder Township, Carbon County. The purpose of the Line is to improve service by resolving projected reliability violations in the region.

To meet transmission reliability standards, PPL Electric proposes to reconstruct the approximately 24-mile long single circuit Lake Harmony-Lake Naomi 138/69 kV line as a double-circuit 138/69 kV transmission line. The new line will begin at PPL Electric's Lake Harmony 69-12 kV Substation, which is located near Big Boulder Ski Area approximately 0.75 miles west of Big Boulder Drive, and will terminate in the area of the Company's Lake Naomi Tap, which is located approximately 600 feet north of Back Mountain Road. The route for the new double-circuit line will follow the route of the current Line in the current right-of-way for approximately 23 of its 24 miles. There are a number of reasons why people develop varicose veins. This includes hormones (pregnancy, puberty, menopause), heredity (family history), occupation (a job that requires a lot of standing) or obesity. Varicose veins develop more commonly in women than in men and almost 50 percent of adults have them.

Varicose veins in and by itself do not cause serious complications; however, they can cause significant discomfort, such as burning pain, itching, leg edema and on occasion a clot can form inside the varicose vein, which can be very painful full. Occasionally, varicose veins can cause bleeding after an injury, due to their higher pressure inside the vein and the proximity to the skin surface. Thrombosis (clot forming) inside a varicose vein is usually treated with heat, anti-inflammatory medication and rest. Injury to a varicose vein usually treated with pressure and elevation.

Treatment options for varicose veins:
• Exercise and diet — Start with the easy stuff first. Losing weight (if you need to) will take some pressure off

ing a low-salt diet will help with swelling.

• Support stockings — If you're in pain, a well-fitting support hose can provide comfort.

• Sclerotherapy — This procedure inserts a highly concentrated saline solution into the vein which makes it slowly disappear over time and can be performed comfortably in an outpatient setting. It is usually only applicable for smaller veins.

• Surgery — There are a

few options to remove varicose veins surgically, so speaking with your doctor about which one suits you best is paramount. Surgery on varicose veins is typically performed on large veins.

Sharing info with unknown relatives can be risky

Dear Annie: A distant relative, whose family I had never heard of, contacted me on the Internet begging for family photos and history for her grandmother.

Out of the goodness of my heart and at great expense, I took a week and sorted through ancient photos and family history, scanned and labeled the photos, and emailed them to her. However, when I later checked Ancestry.com, I saw those photos and family history online. I didn't recognize any connection between her family and mine, although she insists there is one. Furthermore, our family is very private and has no interest in having our history and photographs published on the Internet for anyone to see. Last year, when my cousin had his identity stolen, the authorities said identity thieves often get information (like the mother's maiden name) from genealogical websites.

I wrote this woman a polite email and informed her of the identity theft and our family's request that our privacy be respected. I asked that she

remove the family photos and history from the site. She wrote back a scathing email, calling me "rude" and saying she did not have to be at my beck and call. They said to email: customersolutions@ancestry.com, saying you did not intend for those photographs to be posted. Give as many details as possible, and they will try to resolve it. However, there are no guarantees.

To some extent, you have already lost the battle, because these photos and history are out there, and more importantly, you don't know what else this woman might do with the information. We hope your letter serves as a warning to anyone who sends such personal data to people they barely know (and even those they do). Everything can be posted online and made accessible to anyone who looks.

Notice is hereby given that on June 7, 2013, PPL Electric Utilities Corporation (PPL Electric on the Company) filed with the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (Commission) the Application described above for authorization to reconstruct the Lake Harmony-Lake Nona single circuit 138/69 KV transmission as a double circuit 138/69 KV transmission line in portions of Coalingham, Pocono, and Tobyhanna Townships, Monroe County and Kildler Township, Carbon County. The purpose of the Line is to improve service by resolving projected reliability violations in the region.

To meet transmission reliability standards, PPL Electric proposes to reconstruct the approximately 24-mile long single circuit Lake Harmony-Lake Nona 138/69 KV line as a double circuit 138/69 KV transmission line. The new line will begin at PPL Electric's Lake Harmony 69-12 KV Substation, which is located near Big Boulder Ski Area approximately 0.75 miles west of Big Boulder Drive, and will terminate in the area of the Company's Lake Nona Top, which is located approximately 600 feet north of Back Mountain Road. The route for the new double-circuit line will follow the route of the current Line in the current right-of-way for approximately 23 of its 24 miles. The purpose of the approximately one-mile reroute is to lessen environmental impacts and improve access and maintenance along the Line. The new double-circuit line will be designed for 138 KV operation but initially will be operated at 69 KV.

A Prehearing Conference upon this Application will be held on Tuesday, July 16, 2013, at 10:00 a.m. in Room 318 in the Scranton State Office Building, 100 Lackawanna Avenue, Scranton, Pennsylvania and in Hearing Room 3 in the Commonwealth Keystone Building, 400 North Street, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. Participation in Harrisburg will be by telephone. You may participate at either location. At the Prehearing Conference all persons having properly filed a protest or petition to intervene in accordance with Commission regulations may appear and be heard. The purpose of the Prehearing Conference generally will be to identify the relevant issues and interested parties, if any, and to establish a schedule for the submission of evidence, hearings and other procedural matters, if required.

Under the Commission's regulations, 52 Pa. Code § 57.75(c), if no protests or petitions to intervene opposing the Application have been received by the Commission seven (7) days prior to the date established and set forth above for the Prehearing Conference, PPL Electric, as the Applicant, may request, and the Administrative Law Judge may order, that the Application be decided without a hearing.

Teaching young child that it's not OK to lie

Dear Doctor K: Lately my 4-year-old has started lying to me. She'll say she didn't break a toy, or push her brother, when I know she did. How should I handle this?

Dear Reader: Almost all preschoolers will lie at one time or another—and it's clear they know they're lying, and that they shouldn't be doing that. For example, when one child hits another and is challenged about it, here's the usual sequence of lies: "I didn't do it"; "I didn't mean it"; "I didn't hurt anyway!"

Each lie admits to the preceding lie. It's as if the child realizes there's no way he will get away with the lie, so his only hope is to dismiss the importance of the transgression.

Some preschoolers may not yet realize that it is wrong to lie. Now, at age 4, is the time to teach your child that lying is not acceptable. Doing so at a young age will help mold your child's behavior as she gets older.

To encourage truthfulness when your trustworthiness is up front but not confrontational as you question your child. For example,

ask an open-ended question like, "How did your walls get crayon all over them?" rather than a closed-ended one like, "Did you scribble all over your walls?"

If your child has told a lie, keep your response short and to the point. Be sure to tell her first that you believe she has lied, and because of that, consequences will follow. If your child denies drawing on her walls, for example, you might say, "I know that you drew on your walls, as I saw you do it earlier today. It is never OK to lie to me. You won't be able to play with your crayons for the rest of the day." Do not ignore these seemingly small or harmless lies.

It is always helpful to praise your preschooler for being good, too. Complement her when she tells the truth. Remind her: "I'm glad you told the truth about what happened. When you tell me the truth, I can trust you, and that makes me happy."

Remember that children

learn right from wrong by watching and listening to the adults around them, especially their parents. If they see you telling a little white lie, they will conclude that lying is acceptable. "Do as I say, not as I do" is never an effective strategy, especially when dealing with young children.

And when challenged, she sometimes lies about it. But more often, she is refreshingly honest—and witty. Here's a recent gem, as related by her mom:

Mom: "Cleo! You know you're not supposed to throw a ball in the living room. Why your earth did you do that?"
Cleo: "I think it's because I'm a kid, Mom."

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

The Scandinavian Journalist who first wrote up this deal commented that according to Norse mythology, stormy weather and thunder are caused by Thor and his hammer Mjolnir, and he was sure that Tor Helness' parents had this in mind when he was given his name.

Tor was actually playing for Monaco, though, having managed to transfer his bridge nationally to play for the team led and sponsored by Pierre Zimmermann. And at the bridge tables in Dublin, Tor proved that every day was Thursday—literally Thor's day in Norwegian—since Monaco duly won the main teams event. Today's deal is from the match between Monaco and Russia. Against four spades, West's lead was a low heart to East's ace. East returned the jack, covered by the queen and king.

Needing a safe exit, West played the spade king to dummy's ace, and another spade from dummy was taken by West's queen. West now led a diamond to the queen and ace, after which declarer cashed the spade eight and ruffed his last heart.

The club four disappeared on the spade 10, and West had to surrender. Whether he pitched a diamond or a second club, declarer could take the rest, a classic example of a crisscross squeeze in the Open Series. Helness was the only declarer who managed to bid and make 10 tricks. Only a diamond lead and diamond continuation when West scores his trump trick can defeat the game.

ANSWER: You were looking forward to defending one heart doubled, but partner's second call strongly suggests significant extra shape and little defense. You'd be happy to bid one no-trump with a slightly better club, but you may be too good for a simple preference to two diamonds. If you jump to three diamonds, partner may be able to work out that you have heart length.
