JUDGE ALLISON K. TURNER:

Now is the time and place for a hearing the matter of Corretta Watson versus PECO Energy Company, docketed at 2-01636592. PECO Energy is represented in the hearing room by Lisa A. Lutz, Esquire. And she has with her a witness, Renee Tarpley. Ms. Watson is not present. Normally I wait at least 15 minutes, if any party is late, to see if that party will appear, if they're late for some reason. So I do plan to do that here.

But before I go off the record to wait for her, I would like to just give a brief background. This case was initially listed as part of the call of the docket proceedings on, I believe, December 15th, 2004. And Ms. Watson called and asked for a continuance. She stated at first that she couldn't make it at that time on that date, then that she couldn't make it on that day because she was moving. I offered her the next day on which more were also called to docket hearings, and she said she could not because had already taken too much time off of her job, and she requested to have a hearing during the week between Christmas and New Years. I'm not sure

1 whether she requested it or I suggested it because she
2 is off from work during that week. And the hearing
3 was set for today. A hearing notice has been sent to
4 her and I do not have returned mail with that hearing
5 notice, so I believe I must assume that she has
6 received it.

7 The one element I have of pause about
8 that is, as I'm looking over PECO's proposed exhibits
9 for this hearing, I notice that the last entry is
10 final bill. Does that mean she has been terminated,
11 her service has been terminated?

12 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

13 Discontinued per her request, as she has
14 moved to another address.

15 JUDGE:

16 That's what I was afraid of, discontinued
17 as per her request.

18 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

19 I don't know if we had her new address.

20 JUDGE:

21 Yes. We sent her the notice.

22 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

23 I'm not sure if you did, Your Honor.

24 JUDGE:

25 You do?

1 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

2 Yes. She forwarded everything to the new
3 address.

4 JUDGE:

5 Okay. And what is her new address?

6 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

7 6122 Delancey Street, Philadelphia,
8 Pennsylvania 19143.

9 JUDGE:

10 Okay. And is she receiving service
11 there?

12 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

13 Yes.

14 JUDGE:

15 Okay. And did you transfer the amount
16 from this account to that address?

17 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

18 Not at this time but it will be
19 transferred.

20 JUDGE:

21 Well, I have to double check, but I
22 certainly hope that we sent the hearing notice to that
23 address. I don't have a copy of it here. I'm going
24 to go off the record for at least 15 minutes. I will
25 go and check what address our hearing notice was sent

1 to. And that was one reason I asked previously if had
2 talked to her, but you have not talked to her about
3 the hearing?

4 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

5 I have not.

6 JUDGE:

7 So it's not your responsibility. It's
8 our responsibility to give her notice. I'll just
9 check it. Okay. So let's go off the record.

10 OFF RECORD DISCUSSION

11 JUDGE:

12 In the interim that I've been waiting for
13 Ms. Watson, we've all been waiting for Ms. Watson, I
14 checked with the Commission records. We did not have
15 her new address and as far as I know, we sent the
16 hearing notice to her old address on Master Street. I
17 just called the new phone number that Ms. Lutz gave me
18 and it has been disconnected. So I don't really have
19 any way of getting in touch with her. She certainly
20 has the ability to have her mail forwarded. And she
21 also has the duty to notify the Commission of her
22 change in address. She didn't realize that but she
23 should have given us her new address. Therefore, I'm
24 going to go ahead with the hearing. That's certainly
25 the point of these call to docket cases, is to get the

1 cases processed as quickly as possible, and this is an
2 old and a large debt, and she can file exceptions. So
3 although I'm sorry that we have not, apparently, given
4 her the full notice that we should have given her, I
5 am going to proceed with the hearing. Perhaps the
6 Chief Judge will advise me to do otherwise but since I
7 have you here I'm going to go ahead.

8 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

9 Thank you, Your Honor.

10 JUDGE:

11 Unless you have another opinion, Ms.
12 Lutz?

13 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

14 No. That would be --- that's preferable
15 to PECO, thank you.

16 JUDGE:

17 Okay. So you think it's legally sound?

18 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

19 Yes, I do.

20 JUDGE:

21 Okay. Normally we would begin with Ms.
22 Watson's testimony. She is not here. Therefore, Ms.
23 Lutz, how do you want to proceed?

24 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

25 Your Honor, I would like to create a

1 record on this matter, and I would like to call Ms.
2 Renee Tarpley.

3 JUDGE:

4 Okay. Ms. Tarpley, will you take the
5 witness desk? I'm not sure why we have two chairs
6 there. We swear you in.

7 -----
8 RENEE TARPLEY, HAVING FIRST BEEN DULY SWORN, TESTIFIED
9 AS FOLLOWS:

10 -----

11 JUDGE:

12 Please be seated. Go ahead, Ms. Lutz.

13 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

14 Thank you, Your Honor.

15 DIRECT EXAMINATION

16 BY ATTORNEY LUTZ:

17 Q. Ms. Tarpley, would you please state your full name
18 and spell it for the record?

19 A. Renee Tarpley, R-E-N-E-E T-A-R-P-L-E-Y.

20 Q. Would you please state your business address?

21 A. 2301 Market Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania
22 19101.

23 Q. And by whom are you employed?

24 A. PECO Energy.

25 Q. What is your position at PECO?

1 A. I'm a regulatory assessor.

2 Q. How long have you been employed by PECO?

3 A. Approximately 19 years.

4 Q. Would you please describe your duties as a
5 regulatory assessor?

6 A. Yes. I'm responsible for reviewing informal and
7 formal complaints filed with the Bureau of Consumer
8 Services.

9 Q. In the course of your employment, have you become
10 familiar and reviewed the account of Ms. Corretta
11 Watson?

12 A. Yes.

13 Q. Can I refer you to what has been marked as PECO
14 Exhibit Number One?

15 (Peco Exhibit Number One marked for
16 identification.)

17 A. Yes.

18 BY ATTORNEY LUTZ:

19 Q. Could you tell us, is Ms. Watson a customer at
20 this address?

21 A. Ms. Watson is no longer a customer at 5637 Master
22 Street in Philadelphia, effective December the 6th,
23 2004.

24 Q. Okay. And when her complaint was filed as to this
25 property, what service did Ms. Watson receive from

1 FECO?

2 A. Residential electric and off-peak service.

3 Q. Could you briefly explain this exhibit?

4 A. This is a billing statement of --- for Ms.
5 Corretta Watson at 5637 Master Street. It covers the
6 billing period from December 2002 to when the account
7 was final December 6th, 2004.

8 Q. And what were the circumstances when the account
9 was finalized?

10 A. Ms. Watson requested the services discontinued and
11 transferred to another account, another service
12 address.

13 Q. Okay. And do you have that service address?

14 A. Yes.

15 Q. And could you state that, please?

16 A. That address is 6122 Delancey Street, also in
17 Philadelphia, Pennsylvania 19143.

18 Q. Thank you. On her Master Street account, what was
19 the final balance?

20 A. The final balance is \$7,813.77.

21 Q. When she resided at that property, what was her
22 average monthly billing?

23 A. \$258.

24 Q. And was she on the CAP program?

25 A. Ms. Watson was on the CAP program from September

1 2003 and was removed May 6th, 2004 because she was no
2 longer eligible based on her financial status.

3 Q. Thank you. When was the last payment made on this
4 account by the customer, and in what amount?

5 A. The last payment was March 25th, 2004 for \$260.

6 JUDGE:

7 I'm lost. I'm losing track here. Would
8 you repeat that?

9 A. I'm sorry. I need to correct myself as far as the
10 last payment.

11 JUDGE:

12 Okay. since I didn't hear it the first
13 time. What is it?

14 A. It was April the 5th, 2004 for \$286.74 total.

15 BY ATTORNEY LUTZ:

16 Q. Was that her last payment?

17 JUDGE:

18 That was her last payment?

19 A. That's correct, Your Honor.

20 JUDGE:

21 Thank you.

22 BY ATTORNEY LUTZ:

23 Q. Thank you. Can I now refer you to what has been
24 marked as PECO Exhibit Number Two.

25 (PECO Exhibit Number Two marked for

1 identification.)

2 A. Yes.

3 BY ATTORNEY LJTZ:

4 Q. Would you please describe this exhibit?

5 A. This is a summarization of the payment agreements
6 that were granted on the account for Ms. Watson at
7 Master Street. According to our records, Ms. Watson
8 was granted five payment arrangements by the company
9 and was also given one agreement based on a PCS
10 decision, Bureau of Consumer Services decision.

11 Q. And did she meet these payment arrangements?

12 A. No.

13 Q. Can I now refer you to what has been marked as
14 PECO Exhibit Number Three?

15 (PECO Exhibit Number Three marked for
16 identification.)

17 A. Yes.

18 BY ATTORNEY LUTZ:

19 Q. Would you please describe this exhibit?

20 A. This is a copy of the informal decision that was
21 rendered based --- excuse me, case number 1636592. It
22 was issued in April 2004. The customer was to pay
23 \$1,000 by May 13th, 2004, then beginning with June
24 2004 to pay \$55 towards the back bill in addition to a
25 budget of \$270.

1 Q. Did she meet the terms of this decision?

2 A. No.

3 Q. Ms. Tarpley, what is the STAMMEL catch-up amount
4 on this account since the BCS decision?

5 A. The STAMMEL catch-up amount would be \$1,630 for if
6 you're basing it on the customer's suggested budget at
7 the Master Street address. And that is derived from
8 looking at the budget billing from June 2004 to
9 September 2004, within \$270 per month times four is
10 \$1,080. And the next two billing periods from October
11 to November was \$275 times two, which is \$550. And it
12 brings the budget billing amount to \$1,630 for the
13 actual STAMMEL catch-up.

14 Q. Okay. What is PECO's final position with respect
15 to this account at the Master Street property?

16 A. The company is requesting upon transference to the
17 current address that the customer be required to pay
18 the STAMMEL catch-up amount of \$1,630, in addition to
19 the missed lump sum payment of \$1,000, totaling
20 \$2,630. Then continue to pay \$55 in addition to the
21 suggested budget.

22 Q. Thank you.

23 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

24 Your Honor, I have no further questions
25 for Ms. Tarpley.

1 JUDGE:

2 Okay. I need to go back over some of
3 this information just to make sure I got it right.
4 I'm not sure I was up to speed at all times. Okay.
5 \$55 plus what? What is the current budget?

6 A. Well, her current budget, because she hasn't
7 created a pattern just yet, so it's not derived just
8 yet at her new address. So I don't think ---.

9 JUDGE:

10 Whatever the budget is?

11 A. Whatever the budget is for the new address.

12 JUDGE:

13 Okay. Now, I had October to November,
14 \$275 times two is \$550, and from June 2004 to what
15 month, August?

16 A. September 2004.

17 JUDGE:

18 September 2004. And what was the base
19 amount?

20 A. \$270 times four.

21 JUDGE:

22 Times four. All right. And you have the
23 STAMMEL amount and her budget amount is not a CAP
24 budget amount because she came off CAP in what month?

25 A. May 2004.

1 JUDGE:

2 Okay. And that was also the month of her
3 last payment?

4 A. April was the last payment.

5 JUDGE:

6 April of 2004? Okay. April was her last
7 payment?

8 A. That's correct.

9 JUDGE:

10 And then May she came off CAP?

11 A. That's correct.

12 JUDGE:

13 Okay. And just for my information, does
14 the CAP rate include the off-peak rate also?

15 A. Yes.

16 JUDGE:

17 Okay. And when I look at this statement,
18 is the second line in each billing period the off-peak
19 amount?

20 A. Yes, it is.

21 JUDGE:

22 Okay. And in my memory of other cases,
23 the off-peak amount has to do with the hot water
24 heater; is that correct?

25 A. It could, yes. That's correct. Most customers

1 use it for the hot water heater.

2 JUDGE:

3 Is that the case here, do you know?

4 A. Yes.

5 JUDGE:

6 So this is her off-peak and she had a
7 meter on her hot water heater?

8 A. Exactly.

9 JUDGE:

10 I notice in earlier months that she
11 apparently had a number of returned checks?

12 A. That's correct, Your Honor.

13 JUDGE:

14 Would that be three of them?

15 A. She had three returned checks, yes.

16 JUDGE:

17 Okay. So does PECO have any limitations
18 on how they will accept money from her? Do you follow
19 me?

20 A. I do follow you. I most definitely follow you and
21 the customer should be making her payments in cash,
22 money order or certified check.

23 JUDGE:

24 Okay. Was her service ever terminated?

25 A. No.

1 JUDGE:

2 This relates to my question, which I
3 always have this. How did this bill get this high? I
4 mean, I can see that she didn't make any payments
5 after the BCS decision, from May until the time when
6 she requested termination and transfer. But did PECO
7 make any collection activities to try and curb her at
8 all?

9 A. I'm not sure exactly, you know, the specific dates
10 or what have you, but looking at the customer's
11 account it appears she contacted us numerous times to
12 make payment arrangements, which would, you know, halt
13 the termination process. And then when she filed a
14 complaint, that kept the account on hold also until a
15 decision came through. And then filing a formal
16 complaint, it also keeps it out of collection action.
17 And another thing, in September 2003 when she was
18 enrolled in CAP rate, of course, whatever the balance
19 was at the time was set aside so she didn't reflect in
20 arrears.

21 JUDGE:

22 Okay. So when she went into CAP rate,
23 she had a balance set aside. I don't see that here.
24 But she may have gone into CAP rate before 2002. I
25 don't know when she went into CAP rate.

1 A. She went into CAP rate September 2003.

2 JUDGE:

3 Okay.

4 A. So if you look on the account statement, Your
5 Honor, on page two of three, when she went into CAP
6 rate September 2003, if you look at the entry for
7 October 6, 2003 she was just --- the previous amount
8 was obviously set aside and that's why she was only
9 required to pay \$131.63 instead of the full amount of
10 the bill.

11 JUDGE:

12 But the balance amount didn't change?

13 A. The balance didn't change but it didn't reflect a
14 arrearage because the amount was then moved to another
15 financial area because of the CAP rate enrollment.

16 JUDGE:

17 Okay. I'm taking notes. I'll be with
18 you in a minute.

19 A. Yes.

20 JUDGE:

21 All right. She doesn't seem to have made
22 effective payments after that. She made one payment
23 but the check bounced.

24 A. Yes.

25 JUDGE:

1 And then when we get to April of 2004,
2 she made two payments in one month and she made a
3 payment in March, so that was three payments at one
4 time. Then after that no monthly payments but the BCS
5 decision came out in May.

6 A. Right. She filed a complaint in April 2004. So
7 that immediately put the account on hold at that time
8 from any collection activity.

9 JUDGE:

10 Any you're saying, and I believe this is
11 correct under the regulations, when she filed
12 pre-informal complaints with the company seeking
13 payment arrangements, which we would call a dispute, I
14 believe, under the regulations it was also put on
15 hold?

16 A. That's correct.

17 JUDGE:

18 Okay. I think I understand that. Now,
19 let me just say that when I look at her complaint it
20 says, Complainant states she missed a bill and was
21 taken off the CAP program and is to pay \$6,000 instead
22 of \$1,000. She can afford to pay \$100 a month
23 starting July of 2004. Of course, she did not do
24 that. But I think that the allegation in her
25 complaint is a misstatement. She says, she missed a

1 bill and was taken off the CAP program. But according
2 to your testimony, she was taken off the CAP program
3 because her income changed, not because she missed
4 paying a bill.

5 A. That's correct. She was over the income
6 guidelines.

7 JUDGE:

8 Okay. And is to pay \$6,000 instead of
9 \$1,000. Did you ever ask her to pay \$6,000?

10 A. Yes, we did. When she was taken off the program,
11 when she went through the next billing cycle, that set
12 aside CAP rate amount ---

13 JUDGE:

14 Came back in?

15 A. --- came back in. And turn to exhibit --- page
16 three of the first exhibit, the entry May 6, 2004 you
17 see the amount requested is \$6,224.21 because she was
18 taken off the program at that time.

19 JUDGE:

20 But then the next amount requested is
21 \$1,000.

22 A. Yes, because the BCS decision came through and it
23 was requesting \$1,000 up front, as well as the \$55
24 plus the budget.

25 JUDGE:

1 Okay. So what happened was, that
2 actually she has to pay \$1,000 instead of \$6,000?

3 A. The following month.

4 JUDGE:

5 Right.

6 A. Right.

7 JUDGE:

8 Okay. Although it's true the month
9 before she'd been asked to pay \$1,500 but ---. I hope
10 I have all of this straight and I hope I have the
11 information that the Commission wants. I think one
12 problem is that because she is newly at her new
13 address, we do not know what her average bill would be
14 or what her calculated budget would be at that
15 address; is that correct?

16 A. Well, the average bill that they have is, that's
17 just at \$10 but I know that's fairly unreasonable, you
18 know, for a household. It's a single dwelling so she
19 went in basically at the beginning of the billing
20 period and she should be getting a bill --- we should
21 be reading her meter next month and get a full maybe
22 30 or 29-day bill to get the average.

23 JUDGE:

24 And it would be improper to use the
25 calculated and average bill from the old address.

1 A. I think it would be because she only has electric
2 --- residential electric at the new address, she
3 doesn't have off-peak service at the new address.

4 JUDGE:

5 Okay. Only residential?

6 A. That's correct.

7 JUDGE:

8 Let me see what I have here. So her
9 calculated budget before was \$275; right?

10 A. Yes.

11 JUDGE:

12 Do you have a figure for her average
13 bill?

14 A. \$258.

15 JUDGE:

16 All right. And the transfer from the
17 Master Street account to the Delancey Street account
18 will take place with the next bill also?

19 A. That's correct.

20 JUDGE:

21 So that would be in her January 2005
22 bill?

23 A. That's correct, Your Honor.

24 JUDGE:

25 Just to rough over it, what you want is

1 --- excuse me. What PECO wants is the STAMMEL amount
2 of \$1,630, plus the BCS amount of \$1,000, plus
3 whatever her budget turns out to be, plus \$55?

4 A. That's correct.

5 JUDGE:

6 Okay. And before you are able to
7 calculate a budget, what do you want for the bill, say
8 in January and February? You won't have a calculated
9 budget then.

10 A. It won't be a calculated budget.

11 JUDGE:

12 Do you want current bills?

13 A. The current bills.

14 JUDGE:

15 Okay.

16 A. Until it's established, I think that's fair.

17 JUDGE:

18 And when do you think the budget will be
19 established? Six months?

20 A. Actually, it may be in two months. We just have
21 to get a pattern. Her use of two months is very good
22 to get a budget established for a customer.

23 JUDGE:

24 Maybe two months?

25 A. Yes.

1 JUDGE:

2 All right. Can you think of anything
3 else that I need to know or anything else you don't
4 think I understand that you'd like to tell me
5 before ---?

6 A. No, Your Honor.

7 JUDGE:

8 Okay. Ms. Lutz, do you have redirect?

9 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

10 I have no redirect. I would like to make
11 a motion to admit PECO Exhibits One through Three into
12 the record.

13 JUDGE:

14 They will be so admitted.

15 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

16 I would also like to make a motion to
17 dismiss for failure to prosecute.

18 JUDGE:

19 Yes. Normally I would have no qualms
20 about granting that. As I said, since it appears that
21 the Commission may have failed to give her notice, I
22 don't feel quite so stringent about that. On the
23 other hand, as I say, mail can certainly be forwarded.
24 And on the other hand, since she has given PECO her
25 address, I don't --- she may not be paying her bills

1 but she's not trying to run away so I would make that
2 motion at some point.

3 A. Ms. Watson is here.

4 JUDGE:

5 Good afternoon, Ms. Watson.

6 MS. WATSON:

7 Hi. I'm finally here. I was without a
8 baby-sitter.

9 JUDGE:

10 Let's go off the record for a minute.

11 OFF RECORD DISCUSSION

12 JUDGE:

13 Ms. Watson arrived at about quarter to
14 3:00. She has her son with her. She said she did not
15 have a baby-sitter. The number that I called to reach
16 her was the incorrect number. Her correct telephone
17 number is 267-531-4405. She has been given a copy or
18 a set of the PECO exhibits. And I have described some
19 of the testimony to her, some of PECO's testimony.
20 PECO does not have a settlement offer to make, but has
21 no objection if we take Ms. Watson's testimony. Do
22 you want to testify?

23 MS. WATSON:

24 I really don't ---.

25 JUDGE:

1 I can't hear you.

2 MS. WATSON:

3 I really don't know what to say.

4 JUDGE:

5 You might as well, you're here.

6 MS. WATSON:

7 I'm just really embarrassed because at
8 the time when I signed up for PECO, I was being put
9 out of an apartment and I had moved back to my
10 mother's house. My mother ---.

11 JUDGE:

12 Hold on a minute. If you're going to
13 make those statements, I need to swear you in so I can
14 rely on them.

15 MS. WATSON:

16 Okay.

17 JUDGE:

18 I have to write an opinion. So Ms.
19 Tarpley, why don't you step down. And Ms. Watson,
20 would you mind sitting at the desk? And raise your
21 right hand, please.

22 -----

23 CORRETTA WATSON, HAVING FIRST BEEN DULY SWORN,

24 TESTIFIED AS FOLLOWS:

25 -----

1 JUDGE:

2 Okay. Please go ahead.

3 A. Okay. Like I said, I moved into my mother's
4 house. No one had been there, my mother had a stroke.

5 JUDGE:

6 When was that?

7 A. 2001.

8 JUDGE:

9 And what address was that?

10 A. 5637 Master Street. And at the time my brother
11 was supposed to have been paying bills there, and
12 since I was moving he hadn't paid bills and PECO was
13 about to cut her off because they hadn't heard
14 anything. So since I was moving I said, well, I might
15 as well get this in my name, not knowing everything
16 else that was going on as far as this house has been.
17 Honestly, for two years I have been living in a little
18 black cloud. It's just been one thing after another.
19 The house is falling apart, it's cold, there's no
20 heat. I've been trying to put up with it and I've
21 been trying to --- it seemed like as soon as I could
22 pay a bill to catch up with things I had the mortgage
23 company on me. I had somebody else on me and I had
24 something else falling in the house. Yet I still had
25 PECO on a plan, even though they could have cut my

1 lights off then.

2 I really don't know how to explain why I haven't
3 paid the bill like I should have paid it. It's just
4 been turmoil for me, that's why I moved.

5 JUDGE:

6 It's just been what?

7 A. Turmoil.

8 JUDGE:

9 Turmoil?

10 A. Yeah.

11 JUDGE:

12 Thank you.

13 A. That's why I moved. I had to move for my son and
14 myself. I really moved into the house because at the
15 time my mother had nothing else to rely on. All she
16 knows is that house.

17 JUDGE:

18 Let me ask you a few questions, if I
19 could?

20 A. Uh-huh (yes).

21 JUDGE:

22 Where is your mom now?

23 A. She is in the Hillcrest Center nursing home.

24 JUDGE:

25 And when did she go to Hillcrest?

1 A. She's been there since September of --- September
2 of 2000. I moved in the house June 2001.

3 JUDGE:

4 You lived in the house since June 2001?

5 A. June 2001, 2002. I can't even think.

6 JUDGE:

7 Okay. Let's back up a minute here. This
8 exhibit --- I'm sorry. I shouldn't do that, I know
9 better. PECO Exhibit One. When you look at the first
10 page, the first date is 12/05/02.

11 A. Un-huh (yes).

12 JUDGE:

13 So were you living there at that time?

14 A. I moved in 2002. June of 2002.

15 JUDGE:

16 And you moved in June of 2002?

17 A. Uh-huh (yes).

18 JUDGE:

19 So it's your testimony that the bills
20 that had accumulated up to that time was primarily
21 your mother's bill?

22 A. The bill that was there before I moved there, yes.
23 And then I called, it was June of 2002, to have new
24 services put in my name.

25 JUDGE:

1 In June 2002?

2 A. Uh-huh (yes).

3 JUDGE:

4 All right. Now, in December 2002 the
5 balance was only \$899.98.

6 A. Okay.

7 JUDGE:

8 And then after that it started climbing
9 rapidly, if you'll look at the exhibit. Do you have
10 it with you? I'll let you get it. So a lot of this
11 bill accumulated after you moved in, it would seem to
12 me?

13 A. Uh-huh (yes).

14 JUDGE:

15 But you had had it put in your name in
16 June 2002? Is that a yes?

17 A. Yes.

18 JUDGE:

19 And you were at, for a period of time, on
20 the CAP rate because your income made you eligible?

21 A. Uh-huh (yes).

22 JUDGE:

23 AT some point your income increased and
24 you were no longer eligible?

25 A. Yes.

1 JUDGE:

2 That's why you came off the CAP rate.

3 Did you understand that?

4 A. Yes.

5 JUDGE:

6 It wasn't because you missed a payment,
7 which is what you say in your claim, it was that your
8 income went up. All right. And what you have also
9 said today is that you had many competing claims on
10 income that you had. How many claims?

11 A. When I moved in the house, at the time the
12 mortgage company said it was good that I did because
13 they were about to foreclose on it. They hadn't
14 received a payment in two years. So when I moved in
15 they still had me paying back for those two years.
16 Even up 'til now they're still holding me against
17 those two years because my brother didn't pay anything
18 on the house.

19 JUDGE:

20 Why would he pay? Why was he supposed to
21 pay?

22 A. He's power of attorney.

23 JUDGE:

24 But is he living there?

25 A. No. He left. He left water on, he left lights

1 on, he left the phone on and he didn't pay these
2 things.

3 JUDGE:

4 When you say he left them on, does that
5 mean that she wasn't living there?

6 A. She wasn't living there. So basically I was
7 stuck. Whatever it had amounted to, when I moved in I
8 became responsible for that. So not knowing that I
9 could go anywhere else to get help or anything, I just
10 added it as mortgage to my bank.

11 JUDGE:

12 Okay. Has the mortgage company
13 foreclosed?

14 A. They're in the process of doing that now.

15 JUDGE:

16 Okay. So it's not possible for your
17 family to sell the house?

18 A. No.

19 JUDGE:

20 Normally, we like to try and take income
21 and expense statements. Would you mind giving us your
22 income and expenses?

23 A. The only thing I have is this certificate.

24 JUDGE:

25 Right.

1 A. As far as me having any paperwork ---.

2 JUDGE:

3 She's holding up a form that says,
4 monthly budget information, which you filled out?

5 A. Yes.

6 JUDGE:

7 What I'd like is to ask you to read those
8 into the record. Or I could ask you or whatever, so
9 we have in the record what those amounts are.

10 A. Okay.

11 JUDGE:

12 So your monthly household income is what?

13 A. The total is \$2,230.

14 JUDGE:

15 \$2,230 in one month?

16 A. Yes.

17 JUDGE:

18 And that's from your employment?

19 A. That's from my employment with the School District
20 and my son gets a survivor's check each month.

21 JUDGE:

22 A survivor's check of how much?

23 A. \$600. Well, it just changed to \$630.

24 JUDGE:

25 That's \$600?

1 A. \$630, yes.

2 JUDGE:

3 You say survivor's check. Does that mean
4 that your husband is dead?

5 A. My boy's father.

6 JUDGE:

7 His father's dead?

8 A. Uh-huh (yes).

9 JUDGE:

10 I'm sorry for your loss. So your total
11 monthly income would be \$2,028.60; would that be
12 right?

13 A. No, I'm sorry.

14 JUDGE:

15 I'm not adding that up right. \$2,230
16 plus \$630 is \$2,860; is that right?

17 A. My wages are \$1,600.

18 JUDGE:

19 And then survivor's check is \$630?

20 A. \$630, yes.

21 JUDGE:

22 So I misunderstood what you said. I
23 apologize. So it's \$2,230 total?

24 A. Yes.

25 JUDGE:

1 All right. And that's your entire
2 income?

3 A. Yes.

4 JUDGE:

5 Okay. Now, your expenses would be, if we
6 turn ---. Let's take your expenses for Master Street
7 rather than from Delancey because that's where it was
8 going on.

9 A. Okay. My mortgage ---

10 JUDGE:

11 Uh-huh (yes).

12 A. --- was \$440.

13 JUDGE:

14 \$440. And what was the amount they say
15 you owed, or your mother owed?

16 A. \$7,436.

17 JUDGE:

18 All right. And I think we can look for
19 your electric monthly bill at the PECO Exhibit One.

20 Okay. How about gas bill?

21 A. No gas. There was no heat in the house.

22 Everything in our house ran by electric.

23 JUDGE:

24 I'm having trouble hearing you.

25 A. Everything in my mother's house ran by electric.

1 JUDGE:

2 Okay. Does that mean that the furnace
3 was gas but you didn't have any gas lines?

4 A. No furnace, no gas.

5 JUDGE:

6 So any heat you had was ---?

7 A. Any heat I had was a space heater. That's why
8 this was so high.

9 JUDGE:

10 No gas heat so no gas bill. What kind of
11 telephone bill did you have?

12 A. My telephone bill was \$40.

13 JUDGE:

14 Did you have an arrears on that that you
15 paid on?

16 A. No, not with the last company I had.

17 JUDGE:

18 Okay. And your water bill?

19 A. The water bill was in my mother's name.

20 JUDGE:

21 Did you have to pay it?

22 A. That was thrown up in the air because my brother
23 was paying it, was supposed to pay it and he never
24 paid it.

25 JUDGE:

1 Okay. So there was no water expense
2 because he didn't pay that bill; is that it?

3 A. Uh-huh (yes).

4 JUDGE:

5 Say yes.

6 A. Yes.

7 JUDGE:

8 Sewage and trash pick-up? If you were on
9 the City water, sewage goes with the water and I don't
10 think there's an extra fee?

11 A. No.

12 JUDGE:

13 Trash pickup?

14 A. No. There isn't one.

15 JUDGE:

16 Do you have cable?

17 A. No.

18 JUDGE:

19 You do not have cable there?

20 A. No.

21 JUDGE:

22 Okay. How about food? How much did you
23 spend?

24 A. I spent about \$200 a month.

25 JUDGE:

1 \$200 a month?

2 A. Uh-huh (yes).

3 JUDGE:

4 Did you get food stamps?

5 A. No.

6 JUDGE:

7 Did you spend anything for your son's
8 school uniforms? Did you have any special clothing
9 expenses?

10 A. I spent about \$100 a month.

11 JUDGE:

12 For?

13 A. For clothes because I was buying uniforms.

14 JUDGE:

15 You had to buy him a uniform every month?

16 A. Well, no. I mean, he's a boy, he wears shoes and
17 stuff out quick.

18 JUDGE:

19 Okay. Do you have an automobile?

20 A. Yes.

21 JUDGE:

22 How much a month is that?

23 A. \$200.

24 JUDGE:

25 How about gasoline, repairs, maintenance

1 and car insurance?

2 A. Gas I spend about \$40 a month. It's a small car.
3 Repairs, I really didn't have to do nothing in
4 repairs.

5 JUDGE:

6 How about car insurance?

7 A. That's \$100 a month.

8 JUDGE:

9 Okay. How about other transportation?

10 A. No.

11 JUDGE:

12 How does your son get to school?

13 A. I drop him off.

14 JUDGE:

15 Okay. Do you have any other insurance
16 than car insurance? Renters, homeowners, life
17 insurance, medical insurance?

18 A. I pay life insurance but that comes out of my ---
19 that's through my job. It comes out of my paycheck.
20 It's \$30 a month.

21 JUDGE:

22 \$30 a month?

23 A. Yes.

24 JUDGE:

25 Okay. So when you gave me the amount for

1 wages at the beginning when I was looking at this ---?

2 A. That's take-home.

3 JUDGE:

4 That's take-home, that's net?

5 A. Yes.

6 BRIEF INTERRUPTION

7 JUDGE:

8 All right. I think we just finished with
9 the life insurance. How about medical bills and
10 medical insurance?

11 A. No.

12 JUDGE:

13 You have no medical insurance?

14 A. I have nothing --- anything like that. It comes
15 --- I'm a School District employee so ---.

16 JUDGE:

17 So you have their medical insurance?

18 A. Yes.

19 JUDGE:

20 So how about prescriptions and doctors
21 visits and stuff like that? You have a co-pay or you
22 just don't make any or ---?

23 A. The co-pay is like \$15 now.

24 JUDGE:

25 And do you have any prescriptions and

1 doctors visits?

2 A. No.

3 JUDGE:

4 How about credit cards and charge
5 accounts?

6 A. No.

7 JUDGE:

8 None?

9 A. No.

10 JUDGE:

11 How about loan payments? Do you have any
12 loans?

13 A. No.

14 JUDGE:

15 Any other expenses that I have not
16 mentioned?

17 A. No.

18 JUDGE:

19 Okay. So we're going to have to add up,
20 for that period of time at Master Street, it would be
21 \$440 a month on the mortgage, \$40 for telephone, \$200
22 for food, \$100 for clothing, \$200 a month on the car,
23 gas \$40, car insurance \$100. And then you say life
24 insurance was taken out of your check so I wouldn't
25 consider that an additional expense. It's not like

1 you got money in and then paid it out.

2 A. Okay.

3 JUDGE:

4 Were there any other items that you
5 deducted from your pay?

6 A. No.

7 JUDGE:

8 Savings account, anything of that nature?

9 A. No.

10 JUDGE:

11 Okay.

12 A. Just me paying old bills.

13 JUDGE:

14 I'm having trouble hearing you.

15 A. I said, just me paying old bills. It's never been
16 --- I mean, since I've been there, there's never been
17 a month where I'm just paying that month for mortgage
18 or paying that month for something else. It's been an
19 on-going overdue ---.

20 JUDGE:

21 Can you tell me about those amounts?

22 What were you paying?

23 A. It was mainly extra I was paying for the mortgage
24 because they were calling me every time I go in to
25 make a payment, they're calling me a couple days

1 later, when you coming in with the next payment? You
2 know you still owe for two years and we need to ---.
3 You know, it wasn't like one person was handling my
4 account, you got five or six different people in the
5 office that are calling me. And they're looking at
6 the screen and they're saying, wait a minute, this
7 date says 2000 and this is 2003.

8 JUDGE:

9 Okay. So how much extra a month would
10 you pay?

11 A. It would be one or two months that I paid in one
12 month, you know. In February of this year I paid
13 close to three months just to catch up, to try to
14 catch up. So I've just been ---.

15 JUDGE:

16 So that would be three times \$440?

17 A. Uh-huh (yes).

18 JUDGE:

19 One which would have been current, so you
20 paid two additional months?

21 A. Yep. But it was still, you know, behind. And if
22 I paid that then I cut myself with my car. Then I'd
23 get close to where they're calling me and saying,
24 okay, we're sending the truck. All right. Now, I got
25 to get ---.

1 JUDGE:

2 Truck meaning to move your vehicle?

3 A. To repo, uh-huh (yes). So then I had to take my
4 next pay and I'm paying them two months just to get
5 them off of my back. And then here we go with the
6 mortgage company again. Okay, this is someone else on
7 the phone. I wasn't the person you spoke with. You
8 owe us \$7,000 whatever amount of dollars. We need to
9 see it. So here, I'm popping up again, you know, and
10 it was just constant. It got to a point where I just
11 said, you know what, I'm not even paying it this
12 month. I mean, my son and I were looking at clothes,
13 there's a hole in this, there's a hole in that. He
14 needs shoes, or there's something wrong with my car, I
15 have to get that done, to where I wound up slacking
16 off of paying what I should be paying. Then when I
17 get back into it I'm back to where I started again.
18 So it's just been a constant thing. So as of late
19 I've just been to a point where I'm tired. I'm tired.

20 JUDGE:

21 I understand you're tired, but in your
22 complaint you said that you would pay PECO \$100 a
23 month beginning in July.

24 A. I did.

25 JUDGE:

1 Your account doesn't show that you made
2 any of those payments.

3 A. I know.

4 JUDGE:

5 Okay. Ms. Lutz?

6 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

7 Yes, Your Honor.

8 JUDGE:

9 Do you have Cross Examination?

10 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

11 Yes, I do.

12 CROSS EXAMINATION

13 BY ATTORNEY LUTZ:

14 Q. Ms. Watson, you indicate you're employed at the
15 School District. What school district are you
16 employed at?

17 A. Philadelphia School District.

18 Q. How long have you been employed there?

19 A. About six years.

20 Q. Six years? Okay. And when you lived at your
21 mother's property at Master Street, you and your son,
22 did anyone else reside there with you?

23 A. I had a former ex-boyfriend that moved in with us.
24 But he was only there until December of 2002. He was
25 only there for six months.

1 JUDGE:

2 I'm sorry. I just didn't hear you.

3 A. He was only there for six months, 'til December,
4 from June to December of 2002. That's when I put him
5 out.

6 BY ATTORNEY LUTZ:

7 Q. You had --- there was one other adult only at the
8 property at that time?

9 A. Yes. And he didn't work.

10 Q. And he did not work. And he did not contribute?

11 A. No.

12 Q. Did he receive any welfare or anything?

13 A. No.

14 Q. Nothing at all?

15 JUDGE:

16 You have to say no.

17 A. No. He didn't work or anything.

18 BY ATTORNEY LUTZ:

19 Q. Okay. And at the time that you resided in your
20 mother's property, you indicate your brother was
21 responsible for paying some of those bills?

22 A. Yes.

23 Q. Did he make any payments to you for any of the
24 outstanding amounts?

25 A. No.

1 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

2 I have no further questions.

3 JUDGE:

4 Okay. I have one additional question,
5 which the Commission instructs judges to ask. And
6 that is, how do you explain why you didn't make
7 payments under the BCS decision? You got a BCS
8 decision, which is part of PECO's exhibits, in May of
9 2004, I think. Is that right, May of 2004?

10 MS. TARPLEY:

11 Yes, Your Honor.

12 JUDGE:

13 Okay. And your complaint, first what
14 they said was to pay \$1,000 and then to pay \$270 plus
15 \$55 on the arrears. And your complaint says you
16 couldn't pay the \$1,000.

17 A. I didn't even pay the \$270 they gave me.

18 JUDGE:

19 Right. So my question is, what was the
20 reason you didn't make any payments subject to that
21 BCS decision? Just all the things that you said
22 before?

23 A. Yes.

24 JUDGE:

25 Competing bills?

1 A. It was --- it's been on-going.

2 JUDGE:

3 All right. Do you have any additional
4 testimony you want to give?

5 A. No.

6 JUDGE:

7 Now is your chance. You have the burden
8 of proof so you can correct anything that's come out
9 wrong, you think, because of our questions or if you
10 have any other testimony you want to give.

11 A. I don't know what else to say. I don't know what
12 else to say. Like I said, I feel real embarrassed
13 about this. I really do.

14 JUDGE:

15 Okay. In that case, if you have no more
16 questions of this witness, Ms. Lutz?

17 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

18 I have no more questions.

19 JUDGE:

20 Okay. Then you can be excused from
21 sitting at that desk. You can go back to the table.

22 A. Okay.

23 JUDGE:

24 I think I do need to tell you that at the
25 end of Ms. Tarpley's testimony, what PECO is asking

1 for is the \$1,000 BCS ordered.

2 A. Uh-huh (yes).

3 JUDGE:

4 And a catch-up amount on their bill of
5 \$1,630. And then going forward, whatever your current
6 bill is, plus \$55 a month. And the reason it's stated
7 that way is because you're at a new house, it's
8 impossible to know what your budget would be.

9 A. Uh-huh (yes).

10 JUDGE:

11 Or even what your average bill would be
12 because you haven't even gotten your first bill there
13 yet.

14 A. I know but we did know what it was because in this
15 house is gas. The water is run off of gas.
16 Everything's not run by electric like my mother's
17 house was. So you know, there's no space heaters or
18 anything like that. It's mainly lights, the TV,
19 stereo, you know, and I don't have them --- they're
20 not on all over the house. Whatever room I'm in,
21 that's what's on. I'm not in that room, everything's
22 off. You know, it was different at my mother's house
23 because basically it was the space heater that we were
24 using during the winter time that was drawing --- I
25 mean, the house was cold, it was freezing. It's like

1 when you walk in it's like you're outside, you know,
2 that's how cold it is.

3 JUDGE:

4 Okay. Perhaps one thing we ought to ask,
5 which I didn't do. What was the size of your mother's
6 house and was it a row house or a stand-alone house?

7 A. It was --- it used to be a commercial property.
8 It has a storefront but it's a row house.

9 JUDGE:

10 It's a row. And how many rooms did you
11 have to live in?

12 A. Six. You mean all together?

13 JUDGE:

14 Yes.

15 A. Three bedrooms, me and my son in two ---.

16 JUDGE:

17 Two bedrooms, living room, kitchen?

18 A. There was a dining room upstairs.

19 JUDGE:

20 Dining room?

21 A. Yes.

22 JUDGE:

23 Bathroom?

24 A. Yes.

25 JUDGE:

1 How many?

2 A. Six rooms.

3 JUDGE:

4 Okay. But only one bathroom?

5 A. One bathroom.

6 JUDGE:

7 Okay. And did you have a full basement?

8 A. Yes.

9 JUDGE:

10 And is that where the appliances were,
11 like the hot water heater and the furnace and all that
12 stuff?

13 A. Yes.

14 JUDGE:

15 And your hot water heater, was that
16 electric?

17 A. Yes.

18 JUDGE:

19 And your stove was electric?

20 A. Yes.

21 JUDGE:

22 And then you had a space heater?

23 A. Yes.

24 JUDGE:

25 One space heater?

1 A. Two space heaters.

2 JUDGE:

3 Two space heaters.

4 A. One for upstairs and one for down.

5 JUDGE:

6 Okay. Are there any other electric
7 appliances that we should know about? I know you said
8 TVs. Anything else?

9 A. Air conditioners.

10 JUDGE:

11 Air conditioners?

12 A. In the summertime, yes.

13 JUDGE:

14 Window air conditioners?

15 A. Yes, just one.

16 JUDGE:

17 One, okay. I'm sorry that testimony fell
18 a little bit out of order but since you started
19 talking and I started asking questions, I think I
20 should offer Ms. Lutz the opportunity to ask any
21 additional questions.

22 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

23 I have no questions about the property,
24 thank you.

25 JUDGE:

1 Okay. Thank you, Ms. Watson. Unless
2 PECO has anything further ---?

3 ATTORNEY LUTZ:

4 Nothing further, Your Honor.

5 JUDGE:

6 Okay. And do you have anything further?

7 A. No.

8 JUDGE:

9 Since you've come here, I do want to make
10 sure that you have an opportunity to say everything
11 you want to say, and you feel that you've had that
12 opportunity?

13 A. Yes.

14 JUDGE:

15 Okay. I described the terms of what PECO
16 wants. They also want your payment either in cash,
17 money order or certified check.

18 A. I don't write checks anymore.

19 JUDGE:

20 Okay. I think that covers everything.
21 I'm sorry for your difficulties. I can see that
22 you're having difficulties, but it is my job to issue
23 an order that's going to allow PECO to get paid for
24 its electricity. One of the problems with electricity
25 is we don't have to pay for it until after it's been

1 consumed. So all of this money is for electricity
2 that you have already consumed. And it's certainly
3 the Commission's policy that that consumption be paid
4 for if at all possible. So that's kind of what my
5 order's going to say. I'll have to write an initial
6 decision, and I'll do it as soon as I can. I will
7 wait for the transcript. I think. One of our
8 problems with these cases is that we don't have a
9 speeded up transcript and when I have testimony I like
10 to check the transcript. I'll do the best I can but,
11 you know, this is all so you understand where I'm
12 coming from.

13 A. I understand.

14 JUDGE:

15 Okay. In that case, I think we can
16 adjourn unless you have any more?

17 A. No.

18 JUDGE:

19 No?

20 A. I'm sorry for being late.

21 JUDGE:

22 That's my fault.

23 A. That was my ---.

24 JUDGE:

25 Oh, no. All cell phones off. Okay. We

1 are adjourned.
