What shutdown? Frustrated voters shrug as pols point fingers

NEW YORK – What if they shut down the government and no one cared?

In communities across America, many voters barely noticed the latest spasm of dysfunction in Washington. Those who did were angry and fustrated with their elected leaders but were also growing numb to the near-constant crises that have dominated Donald Trump-era polities. Few expected last weekend's 69-hour government shut-down to have any significant impact on the high-stakes midterm elections in November – a political reality that may make another shutdown more likely.

"I saw absolutely nothing in my life that indicated the government had shut down other than the headlines in the paper," said Florida attorney John Grant, a 74-year-old former Republican state senator. "To me, the government shutdown was a non-event. The whole thing is a joke."

For the vast majority of America, there was no notiocable effect as Congress failed to enact a spending bill late Friday, effectively closing the federal government through Monday evening. Thousands of federal toxykers were furloughed Monday. NASA tours were enucled, and the IRS helpline was closed. Overseas troops worried that they wouldn't be able to wastch Sunday's foothall games. Despite dire warnings from the White House, there was vitually no impact on the military, border patrio or altroot security. There also weren't any disruptions with Social Security payments or Medicare.

week," said Republican strategist Rick Tyler. Washington, however, spent Tues-day bogged down in intense finger-pointing. Shortly before noon, Trump tweeted, "Big win for Republicans as Democrats cave on Shutdown." In the short term at least, Democrats



did appear to lose the political battle. Senate Majority Leader Charles Schumer faced heated criticism from frustrated liberals and glddy Republicans who said he caved on Democrats' wish to protect young immigrants from deportation. Liberal activists scheduled an evening protest outside his Brooklyn home to express their displeasure. History suggests the shutdown will be soon forgotten, however. In 2013, Republicans were overwhelmingly blamed for the 16-day shutdown in which conservatives fought unsuccessfully to strip funding from President Barack Obama's health care law. A year later, Republicans seized the Sen-

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year later, Republicans serzed the sen-ate majority.

"Some could argue the 2013 shut-down helped the GOP," said Republican pollster Chis Wilson." I don't see a high probability that a three-day January shutdown will be a dominant factor in November."

In New Hampshire, former GOP chairwoman Jennifer Horn said she was briefly worried about one of her sons, a Marine. But the shutdown ended long

before troops' paychecks were affected.

"If this 244-day shutdown had any impact, it just reminded the American people how frustrated they are with Washington, D.C.," Hom said. 'Most Americans will not be thinking about the shutdown on Election Day—unless, of course, F.c. 8 comes and we're back at it again."

Indeed, the deal struck on Monday to avert the shutdown was very temporary. Should Congress fail to come up with a new spending plan by Feb. 8, the government would close again. And some fear the lack of broader outrage over the first shutdown of the Trump presidency could make it easier for it to happen again.

"Unless Congress does its job and funds the government, we're going to be back on the merry-go-round again," said J. David Cox, the president of the American Federation of Government

He said his union had 800,000 to 1 million members furloughed Monday.

They will be paid for the lost day of work, Cox said, but many fear the next

shutdown is just around the corner.

"Our people are going to remember very clearly about the fact that Congress is not doing its job," he said.

Outside Washington, voters responded with a collective shrup of disgust.

Mike Scribner, the president of the 1,000-member Teamsters union local in Topeka, Kansas, called the impasse just kind of sickening and said both parties are out of fouch with working Americans.

"It's just a never-ending cycle," said

parties are out or touch with working Americans.

"It's just a never-ending cycle," said Scribner, a 48-year-old independent vote. "It's business as usual for those morons we've elected."

Back in Horida, Grant said he was more focused on his weekend travel plans and going to church than the political games on Capitol Hill. The debate over young immigrants, he said, could and should be solved in 30 minutes.

"Frankly, I'm getting sick and tired of a game where it's all about whether the Republicans or Democrats win," he said. "Let's look beyond the politics, and let's do what's good for America."

GOP lawmakers' train hits garbage truck | Lottery ticket

One confirmed death reported in immediate aftermath. No serious injuries among congressmen and staff

A train carrying Republican lawmakers to their retreat in West Virginia collided with what appeared to be a garbage truck on Wednesday.
According to Amtrak, the train collided with a vehicle on the tracks in Crozet,
Va., a town about 126 miles away from
Washington, D.C.

There is one confirmed fatality and
one serious injury from the crash, White
House Press Secretary Sarah Sanders
said, but no serious injuries among
members of Congress or their staff.
Vork County Congressman Scott Perry, R, Dillisburg, was on the train but was
not injured, according to his office.
Rep. Chuck Fleischmann was on his
way to the restroom when the train hit.
The Tennessee congressman was
thrown around and suffered neck, back
and foot injuries.

"Im in a bit of shock right now," Fleaichmann said in a phone call from the
scene, where he was being treated for
his injuries. "I'm in a whole lot of pain
and discomfort."

**Resichmann said he wasn't sure what the train hit, but it was "a tremendously strong impact."

"When this thing hit, I got thrown," he said.

Currently, Pennsylvania's unemployment rate of 4.7% is one of the highest in the nation (although neighboring New Jersey and West Virginia, states that have raised the minimum wage, have even higher unemployment). That's not to say all Republicans are opposed to raising the minimum wage. York County state senator and guber-

natorial candidate Scott Wagner has proposed raising the minimum to \$8.75 an hour.

While Pennsylvania's minimum

wage lags behind its neighbors, it's not alone nationally. Twenty-one other states have kept the federal minimum of \$7.25, which hasn't changed since 2009.

New research

States across the nation are grap-pling with the minimum wage issue. A big part of the problem: Research on the subject often presents a conflicting pic-ture of whether raising it actually

works.

In a January 2018 report, the Keystone Research Center attempted to study the minimum wage in the Pennsylvania region. Its findings took issue with a standard position among those

who oppose raising the minimum wage: If you raise the minimum wage, busi-nesses won't be able to afford it and low-earning workers will low their jobs. Their report suggested there may be

Their report suggested there may be more going on.

KRC examined the food service industry — known for employing large numbers of low-wage workers — in Pennsylvania and neighboring states and found growth in several neighboring states outpacking Pennsylvania.

Especially notable — New York, with the highest minimum wage of any of Pennsylvania's neighbors — saw higher wages and employment in that sector than Pennsylvania, according to the report.

"A minimum wage increase in Pennsylvania is long overdue and would pro-vide a critical boost to family incomes while making important progress to-

wards reducing income inequality," the report concludes.

But Republicans have questioned the findings of the group before. In 2011, a statement from the Republican Party of Pennsylvania labeled the group a "liberal" think-tank. " and criticized their reducing the property of the prope search methods.

There are already rumblings about another push to increase Pennsylvania's minimum wage.

Democratic State Rep. Patry Kim has been making headlines on the subject, holding a public meeting and promising to introduce legislation to raise the minimum wage. In the past, she has suggested more than doubling the minimum to \$15 per hour by 2024.

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

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
