Dear Ms. Mosco:

It is my understanding that you called my office inquiring about discovery procedures and/or the presentation of evidence at a hearing. Please be advised that my Prehearing Order dated March 7, 2019 contains information and instructions that may be pertinent to your inquiries. Please read the March 7, 2019 Prehearing Order in its entirety, but I would like to draw your attention to a few items.

First, if you intend to present any documents or exhibits as evidence, you must send three copies of each document to me and one copy to every other party in the case. Your documents must be received by me and every other party at least one week prior to the scheduled hearing.

Second, any party may conduct discovery to learn the factual basis of the party's position and/or inquire about factual information known to the other party that is relevant to the case. The regulation at 52 Pa. Code § 5.331(b) provides, in relevant part, "A party shall initiate discovery as early in the proceedings as reasonably possible." Section 5.322 provides, in relevant part, "Parties are encouraged to exchange information on an informal basis." All parties are urged to cooperate in informal information exchanges and in conducting discovery. There are limits on discovery (52 Pa. Code § 5.361) and sanctions for abuse of the discovery process (52 Pa. Code §§ 5.371 & 5.372).

If you believe that a prehearing conference would be beneficial, you may submit a request in writing to me. Remember, however, that any communication you submit to me must be copied to the utility.
