I firmly believe that the Settlement does not produce just and reasonable rates, and the proposed settlement remains a rate shock. The drastic increase in cost of a basic life necessity will certainly hurt the community that CUPA serves. The gradualism is still too steep for our community whose residents are predominantly seniors, on fixed incomes, and young families, struggling to make ends meet. We are not in a "good time". While it is understood that CUPA needs adequate revenue to improve, repair and operate to provide quality resource to the community, I do not believe CUPA has done their due diligence in streamlining their internal operation costs, making better business decisions, finding other cost savings measures, and basically, "trim the fat", while maintaining or achieving a higher standard of providing a life necessity resource.

Any increase would need to be more gradual than the one in the proposed settlement and the "stay out" be extended to give enough time for the unstable economy to recover before any other increase can be demanded by CUPA. These are unprecedented times and many are experiencing financial hardships.
