## Northern ball players soar with new batting cage

Before you can play ball, you need to warm up that swing. Previously, Northern's softball players used a batting cage that was not in winning shape, and the poor surface often made it unusable.

Softball Boosters to the rescue. The boosters applied for a grant from the Polar Bear Foundation and received \$2,500 towards the estimated cost of \$15,000. The PBF wanted to continue helping raise funds so they invited the team to participate in the Polar Plunge with Partners. NHS softball players are not afraid to slide into base while playing softball, and they were not afraid to get wet and cold with the PBF polar plunge.

A majority of the girls took the polar plunge and then challenged other teammates, coaches, parents and younger players. The level of team involvement was inspiring and made the softball team a clear winner of the Polar Plunge with Partners. An additional \$1,447 was raised for the batting cage. When advertising and challenging coaches from the local travel league, NYFA (Northern York Fastpitch Association) to do the polar plunge, a local coach who owns ERS Construction offered his services, and he made connections for concrete and stone with York Concrete and Tomas Hauling respectively. The result was approximately \$10,000 in donated materials and labor: truly a combined effort by the softball, business and school community.

tioned that figure, Barley said clients received all 15 RCAPs they applied for last year. She said the firm has an “ongoing relationship” with Washington Township, for whom they secured \$2M.

Like CNR, DT takes on a limited number of clients per legislative district to avoid having clients compete for the same money. However, DT doesn't currently have clients in York or Cumberland County, so would be able to represent Carroll Township. Unlike some companies, Earley said DT staff help clients write the application and business plan they submit in order to secure grants.

She talked about DT's fee structure that offers clients options: whether they want to go after RCAPs only, or whether they want to secure other monies. For RCAPs only, the fee is 12% of the grant amount; for RCAPs plus other monies, it's only 10% of the RCAP grant plus a success fee of \$5K. Barley was asked to bring a detailed quote to the July 10 supervisors meeting, so it can be compared with that submitted by CRT last week.

Earley pointed out that RCAP grant applications are open only for the month of July, so the board might want to consider making their decision on July 10 to be able to pursue funding immediately. She said if hired, DT would be able to assist Carroll Township in beating the deadline.

Moyer-Schwille recommended forming a grant committee made up of the township manager, two supervisors, and one representative each from the zoning and planning commissions, to review all potential grant firms. She said, “The committee is able to meet more frequently [than the supervisors], and can make a recommendation to the board.” Kelly acknowledged it as “a good idea” but said it can't be voted on until the July 10 meeting since it wasn't on the agenda.

Keith Greenawalt, director of the Dillsburg Area Public Library, and Paul Hayes, president of the Library board of directors, addressed supervisors' questions about how the township's annual donation is spent. Greenawalt said the donation helps run the library, including paying for staff salaries, building maintenance, and running programs. Kelly asked specifically about permission for the Satanic Temple to hold an after-school Satan Club meeting in the library. According to Greenawalt, “The guidance we received from the State Library Association is that if we open our meeting space up to anyone, we have to open it to everyone.”

Hayes explained that the club doesn't meet in a common space, but in a conference room.

Resident Gary Reihart asked if the library conducts background checks on anyone who rents their space.

Greenawalt clarified that the meeting space is available at no cost for non-profit organizations, but stated they don't check out users of their space.

Hayes added the library “doesn't have a choice.” He said, “As long as they follow our procedures, we have no issue with them. We can't, or we would open ourselves up for a lawsuit.”

Supervisor Bush asked if the after-school group couldn't meet anywhere else.

Hays responded, “We have no control over how people waste their time.”

Kelly said, “At the end of the day, there's a cost associated for the group to use the meeting space: electricity, water, etc.”

Secretary Faye Romberger was authorized to have the other organizations to whom the township makes annual donations -

Farmers Fair and New Hope - explain to the board how their donations are spent prior to budget season.

“We can decide how best to spend our money,” Kelly said.

In other business, Inch Property's request to dedicate Limestone Drive as a public street in their mixed-use development at 15 Ore Bank Road was unanimously denied. Moyer-Schwille said, “After their conditional use hearing made retaining ownership of the road a condition of approval, we shouldn't be altering it after the fact.”

Before unanimously voting to extend the preliminary land development plan of TCNE Route 74 Associates, LLC, to July 10, supervisors allowed township engineer Phil Brath to discuss outstanding items with Josh Hoffman, senior engineer with Pennoni Associates, who are developing the 35 acres along Rt. 15 and Rt. 74.

According to Hoffman, primary access to the property will be from Rt. 74. He says the traffic study received “conditional approval” from PennDOT. The property's sewage approval and MPDS permit will come from the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). Hoffman says DEP and Army Corps of Engineers jointly need to approve the driveway crossing wetlands on the property.

Among the waivers being requested are minor administrative items such as increased size of the plan sheets, as well as more significant items such as steeper slope for landscape buffers, and larger fill slope, basin side slopes, and the slope at the bottom of the basin which “contradicts infiltration requirements,” according to Hoffman.

He suggested fencing at the top of fill slopes as well as basins, but supervisors expressed concerns about trash collecting against the fence, creating an eyesore. Hoffman said a “maintenance and operations manual” would be created for the property's eventual owners, specifying that storm water drainage can't be clogged, and instructions for clearing and mowing would lay out semi-annual maintenance for meadow-like areas planned instead of turf grass that requires weekly mowing.

In terms of the driveway crossing wetlands, Hoffman says there's “no alternative”. He said the drive was located at the narrowest part of the wetlands and is only one-tenth of an acre, but because of having to access the property from Rt. 74, he thinks that “anyone” using the property would have to use the same location. Hoffman says the developers will “have to mitigate” their impact on the wetlands “either onsite or elsewhere”.

Brath said the developers' traffic study needs to be submitted. Developers are seeking a right-of-way from Shumaker's; failure to secure that will require the traffic study to be redone. Additionally, the traffic assessment was done for a warehouse, but if the property is “converted” to a distribution center, the assessment also would need to be redone. # WWII Veteran of ETO to speak

The Central PA WWII Roundtable will hold its monthly meeting on Thursday, July 6th at 7:00 p.m. at Grace United Methodist Church, 433 East Main Street, Hummelstown. Wilbur “Jack” Myers, 100 years old, will speak of serving as an antitank gunner, supporting the 104th Infantry Division, in the European theatre.

Myers, of Hagerstown, MD, entered service in 1943, training in Texas before “shipping out” across the Atlantic to Cherbourg, France. He operated a three-inch antitank gun and later worked in a 40-ton M36 tank destroyer. His battalion advanced to Aachen, Germany, and the Siegfried line and joined Patton's Army at the Battle of the Bulge. During the battle, the battalion served as

Supervisor Bush asked about oil/water separators, which Brath said could be made a condition of approval, stating, “It's good to require that so oil doesn't have to be caught in the basins.”

Courtney agreed to provide details about how high the retaining wall would need to be in order meet slope, since supervisors expressed concern it would make the wall excessively high.

In other business, Reihart recommended the board adapt membership of the already existing comprehensive plan committee to “speed along” dealing with the grant process and comprehensive plan. Kelly said that couldn't be acted on until the July 10 meeting, and said he was unsure if a possible supervisor-elect could be named to the committee as Reihart suggested.

Moyer-Schwille said one of the supervisors should attend the Pennsylvania State Association of Township Supervisors (PSATS) meetings. “A lot of important discussion” occurs there, she said, including grant overviews earlier this year.

represent Carroll Township on the Northern York County Emergency Management Association (NEMA) was tabled until the July 10 meeting in order to give supervisors Bush and Wall a chance to meet with them first.

During his report, Northern York Fire & Rescue chief Hector Morales said he wasn't aware that a local beer distributor was conducting a fundraiser for the organization this weekend because it's been a busy month with 252 hours of training, but is anticipating a successful event.

Supervisors unanimously approved advertising for sealed bids for a 2014 Taurus Police Interceptor Sedan with 149,943 miles; and authorizing Conrad Siegel to perform an audit of the police pension for approximately \$4,000 to determine if the fund would support buyout of retired police officers' sick and annual leave. Moyer-Schwille asked where the cost of the study would come from; Kelly said it would be paid from the general fund.

Supervisors also unanimously approved extending the final subdivision plan for Harold C. Willis to Aug. 30. Two properties on the Monaghan Township tax rolls with minute portions in the township were deferred to Monaghan for consideration: Ryan & Coty Simpson's lot consolidation merger plan, and Roger & Mary Petrone's four-lot final subdivision plan.
