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RESPONDENT'S STATUS REPORT

Respondent Duquesne Light Company ("Duquesne Light"), by and through its attorneys, files this Status Report pursuant to the Presiding Administrative Law Judge's Interim Order dated June 12, 2024.

1. On June 11, 2024, Duquesne Light provided Complainants with material information regarding a possible accommodation for Complainants' smart meter.
2. On June 12, 2024, the Presiding Administrative Law Judge held a status conference between the parties.
3. During the status conference, the Presiding Administrative Law Judge granted the parties two (2) months to partake in meaningful discussions to determine whether a reasonable accommodation could be reached between the parties.
4. On August 14, 2024, Duquesne Light received a response from Complainants asking for certain clarifications regarding Duquesne Light's proposed accommodations.
5. Complainants further suggested in their response that there is a reasonable expectation that one of Duquesne Light's proposed accommodations could work.

6. Duquesne Light intends to attempt to respond to Complainants' questions in the hopes of seeking an accommodation and resolution. But since that outcome is not guaranteed, Duquesne Light respectfully requests that the stay be lifted and the hearing on its Motion in Limine to preclude Complainants' expert witnesses be scheduled to take place in the next 60-90 days. This will allow the parties some additional time to see if an accommodation can be reached, without unduly delaying these proceedings if an accommodation cannot be reached.
