has suffered "unwarranted and retaliatory" condemnations by borough officials.

In December 2024, U.S. District Judge Karoline Mehalchick denied a request for a preliminary injunction that would allow the facilities to reopen, finding that the plaintiffs "failed to establish irreparable harm or that they are likely to succeed on the merits of most of their claims."

Hellinger appealed that denial to the Third Circuit, which heard oral arguments in the case last week.

Hellinger's attorney, Alexander M. Brunelle, of the Scranton-based Brunelle Law Group, told the appellate court that the crux of the case is a "blatant lack of due process" afforded to residents under Kingston's zoning ordinance. "It's more of a legal terms violation and a due process violation than us overtly saying that there's any overt religious animus," Brunelle said, according to an audio recording of the hearing posted on the court's website.

He argued that the borough's zoning ordinance requires religious institutions to apply for both a variance and a special exception, and said Hellinger did not do so because he felt it would be "futile."

"I believe Rabbi Hellinger met with them, wanted to cooperate, and he was basically told, 'You are a school. You are a dormitory. Now apply for these things,'" Brunelle argued. "The idea that you need to apply for a variance, the idea

that you need to apply for a special exception, that is the unequal treatment."

Attorney Stephen Rhoads, who represents Kingston, countered that advertisements for the facilities identified them as a school and a boarding house, and said Hellinger failed to take the necessary steps to gain approval.

"They did not avail themselves of the process that was available to them as well as to everyone else in the community to be able to conduct a particular use," he said.

He noted that there is a "growing religious community" in Kingston and said the borough's zoning ordinance is intended to apply equally to all.

"We don't feel that the ordinance is necessarily treating religious institutions differently," Rhoads said. "It's just setting the bar for a number of others."

However, the justices had some pointed questions for him, specifically noting that the ordinance bans houses of worship unless the borough specifically approves a variance.

"So there can be no place of worship unless the government is asked the permission to have one?" one of the justices asked. "That's right," Rhoads acknowledged.

The court is expected to rule on the issue regarding the preliminary injunction at a later date.

Hellinger's lawsuit is seeking a court order declaring the borough's actions illegal as well as a protective order banning further discriminatory conduct, along with unspecified damages.

change," Fetterman said. "I want a conversation on the DHS appropriations bill and support stripping it from the minibus. It is unlikely that will happen and our

country will suffer another shutdown. We must find a way forward and I remain committed to being a voice of reason and common sense."

Brittain said she was aware of Fetterman's stated intentions, but that the group nevertheless wanted to make

its voice heard.

"It's our job to show that the people want him to change his position on this," Brittain said. "He was elected to serve all of the people in Pennsylvania. He has a responsibility to look at what's happening in this country and what could be

coming to Pennsylvania and say, the least we can do is not give additional funding when there's no accountability, when people are being murdered on the streets."

contractor they would like to perform the job based on the vendor's ratings, reviews and price, Caballero said.

Caballero noted that once vendors send a time-stamped photo of the completed work, homeowners pay through the GreenPal app.

Originally started as an app to help homeowners hire vendors for lawn care services, GreenPal expanded to offer snow removal, including in the Scranton, Wilkes-Barre, Hazleton and Pottsville areas.

To book snow removal services through GreenPal,

visit yourgreenpal.com/snow-removal-services.

There are more than 20 vendors offering snow removal services in the greater Scranton area, Caballero said.

"We attempted to be the default way that homeowners get their lawn mowed, and then ... decided to add the snow removal piece of it," he said. "A lot of the natural progression for vendors in the north is mow in the spring, summer and fall, and then in the winter do snow removal. We keep a close ear on when homeowners and vendors are asking for a service, and just try to make it happen."

The timing of the launch in Scranton coincided with a storm Sunday that dumped more than 10 inches of snow in Scranton, 15 inches in

don't need to be out there, they are the ones that are most vulnerable for any sort of fall, and anything like that can almost be deadly," he said. "There's just no need for that to happen when it's a few touches of buttons away."

Additionally, Caballero believes customers enjoy the same convenience on the GreenPal app that they've grown to appreciate with services like DoorDash and Uber.

"I think the timing has kind of been perfect," he said. "It seems like the consumer mindset has kind of shifted.

We don't want to have to call anybody — everybody just wants to hit a button and your food shows up or a car shows up. I think it's the same way with home services now."



NOTICE OF PROPOSED RATE CHANGE

To Our Customers:

UGI Utilities – Gas Division (UGI or company) is filing a request with the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (PUC) to increase your natural gas rates as of March 29, 2026. This notice describes the company's rate request, the PUC's role, and what actions you can take.

UGI Utilities – Gas Division has requested an overall rate increase of \$99.4 million per year. This filing also includes a request for approval of a modification and extension of UGI's existing alternative rate mechanism in accordance with 68 Pa. C.S. § 1330 – Weather Normalization Adjustment pilot mechanism, that would be effective with the November 2027 billing cycle.

If the company's entire request is approved, the total bill for a typical residential heating customer using 68.7 ccf per month would increase from \$113.64 to \$123.55 per month or by 8.7%.

The total bill for a typical commercial heating customer using 26.8 mcf per month would increase from \$336.74 to \$358.17 per month or by 6.4%.

The total bill for a typical industrial customer using 54.6 mcf per month would increase from \$647.57 to \$688.65 per month or by 6.3%.

To find out your customer class or how the requested increase may affect your gas bill, contact UGI Utilities – Gas Division at: 1-800-376-2722. The rates requested by the company may be found in proposed Supplement No. 63 to UGI Gas Tariff Numbers 7 & 7.1. You may examine the material filed with the PUC which explains the requested increase and the reasons for it. A copy of this material is kept at UGI's office. Upon request, the company will send you the Statement of Reasons for proposed Supplement No. 63 to UGI Gas Tariff Numbers 7 & 7.1, explaining why the rate increase has been requested.

The state agency which approves rates for public utilities is the PUC. The PUC will examine the requested rate increase and can prevent existing rates from changing until it investigates and/or holds hearings on the request. The company must prove that the requested rates are reasonable. After examining the evidence, the PUC may grant all, some, or none of the request or may reduce existing rates.

The PUC may change the amount of the rate increase requested by the utility for each customer class. As a result, the rate charged to you may be different than the rate requested by the company and shown above.

There are ways to challenge a company's request to change its rates:

1. You can file a formal complaint. If you want a hearing before a judge, you must file a formal complaint. By filing a formal complaint, you assure yourself the opportunity to take part in hearings about the rate increase request. All complaints should be filed with the PUC before March 29, 2026. If no formal complaints are filed, the Commission may grant all, some, or none of the request without holding a hearing before a judge. You can send the PUC a letter telling them why you object to the requested rate increase. Sometimes there is information in these letters that makes us aware of problems with the company's service or management. This information can be helpful when we investigate the rate request. Send your letter or request for a formal complaint form to: The Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, Post Office Box 2065, Harrisburg, PA 17105-2065. 2. You can be a witness at a public input hearing. Public input hearings are held if the Commission opens an investigation of the company's rate increase request and if there is a large number of customers interested in the case. At these hearings you have the opportunity to present your views in person to the PUC judge hearing the case and the company representatives. All testimony given "under oath" becomes part of the official rate case record. These hearings are held in the service area of the company.

Her body, discovered on Feb. 28, 2024, had been wrapped in a tarp, bound with rope and extension cords and buried about a foot deep in the hard-packed dirt floor of the basement of 142 Carlisle St.

Danielle Fox said Tuesday that the rowhouse, which her mother used to own, was her childhood home.

"The 'house of horrors,' they call it. Terrible," Danielle Fox said.

The transformation from a family home to a spine-tingling crime scene began to take place after Danielle Fox's father died and others began moving in to help pay the bills, she said.

Danielle Fox said Race is a cousin through adoption, and that her mother had taken Wolfe in when he was homeless. Linnette and Doyle also moved in during that period, she said, adding that she met Linnette after she brought Cuevas-Ingram to the area from Saginaw, Michigan.

"I actually thought she was a nice person. She put on a big show," Danielle Fox said. "What she did to my mom — she acted so sweet. She had me fooled."

Danielle Fox said she later learned her mother was

being abused in the home. "They took all her money. They abused her. They starved her," she said. "My mom was locked in a room. She didn't know nothing about (Cuevas-Ingram's) murder or nothing."

Danielle Fox said her mother was eventually removed from the home amid elder abuse accusations and went to live with her in Minersville for a time.

However, Linnette began talking to Debra Fox by phone and "kept on going at it until she wanted to go back," Danielle Fox said.

"She just wanted to move back in," Danielle Fox said. "I sat here and cried for an hour or two. Do not go back down there. I do not want you being charged with theft stemming from the Social Security payments she is alleged to have stolen. They are also continuing to await trial on murder charges alleging they murdered Cuevas-Ingram along with the help of Race, Wolfe and Beamer."

Linnette and Doyle are charged with criminal homicide and abuse of a corpse in connection with Debra Fox's death. Linnette is also charged with theft stemming from the Social Security payments she is alleged to have stolen. They are also continuing to await trial on murder charges alleging they murdered Cuevas-Ingram along with the help of Race, Wolfe and Beamer.

Luzerne County District Attorney Sam Sanguedolce has said prosecutors are considering the death penalty as an option in the cases.

Police then learned Linnette had begun collecting Debra Fox's \$1,600 monthly Social Security check and transferring the money to a Cash App account for her own personal use, according to the charges.

The charges allege Linnette and Doyle abused Debra Fox over an extended period, denying her food, beating her and forcing her to stand in a corner without her prosthetic leg.

"How could somebody do that to somebody else's mother?" Danielle Fox said. "I'm just very depressed. I can't fully sleep. I'm just taking it very hard."

Linnette is also charged with theft stemming from the Social Security payments she is alleged to have stolen. "I think there's potential in all of them, but it's the fine details that really matter with any of them," she said. "Transparency has been a huge problem within the state, and even local, level. I think that is kind of the emotion behind why residents even feel so upset and scared. There are a lot of questions, and there are very little answers, and there is little opportunity for members to even participate. They're creating a lot of bills right now, but they're just kind of doing it on their own and pushing it through, rather than opening it up for public review and maybe a town hall to ask questions about it and give feedback on it. People want to know what's going on and they want to be a part of it to ensure it fits our future, and that it considers us in that future."

Misewicz-Healey noted it's especially critical that the regulations be held to strict environmental standards.

"Sustainable, responsible development is absolutely important for human survival," she said. "We have to get this right. We can't be reckless about this."

She also would have liked to see Shapiro propose a one-year moratorium to limit the number of new data center projects.

"What we need, more than anything, is to slow this down and properly review it," Misewicz-Healey said. "I think, above all else, that's what all the residents want to hear right now."

SUPPORTING EMERGENCY RESPONDERS

Shapiro's budget proposal includes a \$30 million

investment in competitive grants through the Office of the State Fire Commissioner — doubling annual funding — to support recruitment, retention, and capital needs for volunteer and professional fire companies.

Scranton Fire Chief John Judge expressed optimism that the funding will come through this year.

"Fire departments across the state are struggling with funding for improvements to aging infrastructure," he said. "Anytime they can get money aside in a competitive grant process, we definitely support that."

Hopefully they can take the \$6 million they continue to send to the western part of the state for Urban Search & Rescue teams and possibly add that to the \$30 million. I'm encouraged that he's continuing to put it in and hopefully the legislature will keep that funding stream in there for a competitive grant so we can update boiler systems, generators, and garage doors — the basic needs in fire stations across the Commonwealth."

HOUSING DEMANDS

Scranton Mayor Paige Gebhardt Cognetti attended Shapiro's address in Harrisburg and believes his plans for meeting the housing demand lines up with the city's efforts.

"His comprehensive plan for housing really goes hand-in-hand with what we've been doing in the city with making sure we've streamlined our permitting department and permitting fees," she said. "The governor is also focusing on permitting reform and working with localities to make sure it matches the need for housing going forward."

Sen. Dave Argall, R-29, who serves Schuylkill, Carbon, and southern

Luzerne counties, also agrees with Shapiro that housing remains a critical issue in Pennsylvania.

"I am committed to expanding public-private partnerships to deliver more housing in our region, and we need policies that promote homeownership and remove unnecessary regulatory barriers," he said. "As a member of our state Senate's majority leadership team, I will continue to advocate for honest budgeting, restrained spending and policies that help more Pennsylvanians achieve the American Dream throughout this large district in Carbon, Luzerne and Schuylkill counties."

HIGHER EDUCATION

Shapiro emphasized expanded access to education and training, investing in career and technical education, strengthening higher education pathways and addressing workforce shortages, according to a release from Luzerne County Community College.

He cited the growing demand for adult education and GED programs, noting that more than 700 individuals are currently on the waiting list at LCCC alone — a powerful example of both the challenge and the opportunity facing the state.

"Governor Shapiro made it clear today that Pennsylvania's future depends on education that is accessible, affordable, and directly connected to workforce needs — and that is exactly what community colleges like LCCC deliver every day," said John Yudichewy, President, Luzerne County Community College. "When you invest in community colleges, you are investing in local talent, local employers, and local economic growth."

Shapiro is also proposing an additional \$565 million for school districts with an "adequacy gap" and \$300 million more for public transit agencies starting in 2027.

He's also asking for \$100 million from the rainy day fund to create a "federal response fund" to mitigate "actions or inactions" by the federal government and \$100 million for a state innovation fund to subsidize venture capital firms, clinical trials and university research. The latter would be funded by the sale of tax credits to insurance compa-

nies. Shapiro used his Tuesday address to renew calls for policy changes like raising the minimum wage.

The Legislature last voted to raise the state's minimum wage in 2006, and it's currently aligned with the federal minimum of \$7.25 an hour.

On housing, Shapiro wants to cap rent increases on manufactured homes' lots, seal eviction records and modernize the state's planning code, among other changes.

He is also calling on the Legislature to regulate data centers and invest in economic development by rewriting existing tax credits or starting a new billion-dol-

lar debt-backed program to invest in "critical infrastructure" like power plants.

And amid criticism from survivors that he hasn't done enough, Shapiro is asking lawmakers to open a long-awaited window so adult victims of childhood sexual abuse can file lawsuits.

Trump on everything from his hurricane response in his native Puerto Rico to his treatment of immigrants. On Sunday night, he blasted ICE while accepting an award at the Grammys.

His latest tour skipped the continental U.S. because of fears that his fans could be targeted by immigration agents.

Trump, a Republican, has said he doesn't plan to attend this year's game, unlike last year, and he has derided Bad Bunny as a "terrible choice." A Republican senator is calling it "the woke bowl." And a prominent conservative group plans to hold an alternative show that it hopes will steal attention from the main event.

The Super Bowl is one of the few remaining cultural touchstones viewed by millions of people in real time and the halftime show is no stranger to controversy, perhaps most notably Janet Jackson's 2004 performance in which her breast was briefly exposed. But there are few parallels to this year's game, which has the potential to become an unusual mix of sports, entertainment, politics and protest. And it will unfold at a tinderbox moment for the U.S., just two weeks after Alex Prett's killing by federal agents in Minneapolis reignited a national debate over the Trump administration's hard-line law enforcement tactics.

Barber, a former player for the New York Giants who played in the Super Bowl in 2001 and has since attended several as a commentator. "I hope it doesn't devolve, because if it does, then I think we're really losing touch with what's important in our society."

The 31-year-old Bad Bunny, born in Puerto Rico as Benito Antonio Martinez Ocasio, has elevated Latino music into the mainstream with his global fame with songs almost entirely in Spanish — something that irks many of his conservative detractors.

He has leaned into the controversy, referring to the halftime show when he hosted "Saturday Night Live" in October by joking "everybody is happy about it — even Fox News."

He segued into a few sentences in Spanish, expressing Latino pride in the achievement, and finished by saying in English, "If you didn't understand what I just said, you have four months to learn."

Those who follow him closely doubt that he'll back down now. "He has made it very clear what he stands for," said Vanessa Diaz, a professor at Loyola Marymount University and co-author of "P FKN R: How Bad Bunny Became the Global Voice of Puerto Rican Resistance." "So I can't imagine that this would all go away with the Super Bowl."

The halftime show is a collaboration between the NFL, Roc Nation and Apple Music. Roc Nation curates the performers and Apple Music distributes the performance while the NFL ultimately controls the stage, broadcast and branding.

The NFL, which is working to expand its appeal across the world, including into Latin America, said it never considered removing Bad Bunny from the halftime show even after criticism from Trump and some of his supporters.

NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell on Monday described the singer as "one of the great artists in the world," as well as someone who understands the power of the Super Bowl performance "to unite people and to be able to bring people together."

"I think artists in the past have done that. I think Bad Bunny understands that. And I think you'll have a great performance," Goodell told reporters during his annual Super Bowl press conference.

About half of Americans approved of Bad Bunny as the halftime performer, according to an October poll from Quinnipiac University. But there were substantial gaps with about three-quarters of Democrats backing the pick compared to just 16% of Republicans. About 60% of Black and Hispanic adults approved of the selection compared to 41% of whites.

Republicans are eager to maintain Latino support in their bid to keep control of Congress. But as the Super Bowl draws near, many in the GOP have kept up their Bad Bunny critiques.

Sen. Tommy Tuberville of Alabama, the former head football coach at Auburn University who is now running for governor, derided the "Voke Bowl" on Newsmax last week and said he'll watch an alternative event hosted by Turning Point USA.
