OPINION AND ORDER

BY THE COMMISSION:

By Order of the Public Utility Commission dated June 20, 1991, Paging Network of Pittsburgh, Inc., was granted approval to furnish one-way mobile communications service to the public in the 900 MHZ frequency band within the reliable service area of 12 transmitters located in Butler, Coraopolis, Evans City, Greensburg, Greenville, Kittanning, Monessen, New Castle, Pittsburgh, Uniontown, Washington and Cherry Hill Township. On September 19, 1991 Paging Network of Pittsburgh, Inc., filed its' original Tariff Radio-Telephone Pa. P.U.C. No. 1. This tariff is to become effective on November 19, 1991.

The Company in its initial tariff provides for identical service and rates as its sister Company, Digital Paging Systems of Philadelphia, Inc. The new tariff provides for Tone-Only Service, Digital Display Service, and Alphanumeric Display Service. The new tariff does not provide for Tone-Voice Service as does the tariff of Digital Paging Systems of Philadelphia, Inc.

The initial tariff also provides for a Flexible Rate to be made available when the Carrier determines that a customer has the opportunity to receive service from a competitor at a rate less than that provided for in the Carrier's initial tariff. The flexible rate cannot be less than the cost of providing service to the customer.


After our review, it does not appear that the rates, rules and regulations contained in the proposed initial tariff are unlawful, unjust, unreasonable, or contrary to the public interest, therefore, they will be allowed to become effective. However, this permission does not constitute a determination that such tariff rules and regulations are just and reasonable, but only that further investigation is not warranted at this time; **THEREFORE,**

**IT IS ORDERED:**

1. That Radio-Telephone Pa. P.U.C. No. 1 as filed by Paging Network of Pittsburgh, Inc., be, and hereby is, permitted to become effective for service rendered on or after November 19, 1991.

2. That this Opinion and Order is without prejudice to any Formal Complaints filed against Respondent's proposed tariff changes.
